

WAGERING EVEN ON BAER-NOVA BATTLE

Coast Heavyweight Gains Favor by Serious Work in Camp.

NEW YORK, June 1.—(AP)—That rare product of Belgium, an even-money fight, takes place at Yankee stadium tonight when Max Baer, the former champion, attempts a 15-round comeback against Leo Nova, promising and cocky young coast heavyweight.

If the betting isn't all-square by the time they start throwing gloves under the hot lights, it will be as close as the next breath. Seldom has opinion on the result of so important a heavyweight scrap been divided so sharply.

Baer's followers bank on him to knock his 24-year-old rival klegking in the early rounds. Nova's admirers expect the handsome, determined ex-amateur champion to jolt out a clean decision, perhaps even to stop the 36-year-old Maxie in the late rounds.

Nearly eight weeks ago, when Baer buckled down to the most serious training of his gloriof career, the bookmakers around here were offering a tentative 2 to 1 he would whip Nova. That has been whittled down gradually to where, last night, Nova actually was favored at 10 to 11 in several large wagers.

Several factors have contributed to the shift in smart sentiment. Nova has trained methodically and perfectly at Nyack, obviously gaining confidence with every workout. Jim Braddock, who took the title from Baer, has been training almost daily with Leo, teaching him how to make a sap out of Maxie, and will be in his corner tonight.

Baer, on the other hand, has not been so impressive. Suddenly turning serious after all the easy years doesn't appear to have agreed with him. There's no doubt he has gone all in like a martyr, yet somehow he looks tired and the elastic has gone from his legs.

As for his boxing, it obviously has not improved. Maxie, even when he was champion, never bothered to develop a good left and his defense never was more than a runner. He reached the top with a terrific right-hand punch, and that's what he still has. It's practically all he has left, and it's a dilly when it lands.

In the opinion of most, Nova will need only to step inside and evade that one ponderous blow for 15 rounds to walk off with the decision and sew up a championship match with either Joe Louis or Tony Galento in September. This is what Braddock has been teaching him to do.

ANGELS LEADING BY THREE GAMES

Stubout pitching by big Leo Sileo, Los Angeles right-hander, dropped Oakland's struggling Oaks back into the second division in the Pacific Coast baseball league race today as the Angels increased their lead to three full games.

Sileo, acquired this season from the New York Yankee-owned Newark club, was touched for only five hits at Los Angeles last night as the Angels blanked Oakland, 6 to 0.

Second-place Seattle took another step on the climb from Sacramento; the outcome not only helping Los Angeles increase its lead but also enabling the Solons to get out of the league cellar in favor of Portland.

Sacramento won, 5 to 4, at Seattle, although out hit, 5 to 11. The Solons tallied three in the second inning and one each in the fourth and fifth. Perfectly-accused double play stopped Butler tallies on three occasions.

Hollywood stepped up from fifth to fourth place by blanking San Francisco, 4 to 3, at Seals' stadium, as Ruzger Ardizola studied his twirling in the pinches. He gave up seven hits against eight his mates swatted off Ed Stutz and Wig Ballon, who went to the hill in the ninth. The Seals scored two runs in the ninth.

By the same score, 4 to 3, San Diego defeated Portland at the northern city, shoving the Beavers back into the cellar, from which they climbed only two days ago.

Portland was leading by a 2 to 2 count going into the final inning, but the Padres drove across two runs on singles by Hal Patchett and George McDonald.

RACE DRIVERS GET VICTORY AWARDS

INDIANAPOLIS, June 1.—(AP)—Drivers in the 500-mile automobile race here Memorial day got their rewards at a victory dinner last night in the form of about \$100,000 cash and assorted trophies.

Wilbur Shaw of Indianapolis, who won, received \$27,405, including the \$20,000 first prize and lap and accessory prizes, the checkered flag of victory, two trophies and an electric refrigerator.

The medal for the 1938 American Automobile association driving championship and \$500 in speedway prize money were awarded posthumously to Floyd Roberts of Van Nuys, Calif., killed in the race. Roberts won the 1935 event.

MENTAL CONDITION OF CAPONE POOR

LABOR PARTY KILLS UNITY PROPOSAL

SOUTHPORT, England, June 1.—(AP)—The labor party's annual conference today rejected a proposal for a united front with the communist, cooperative and liberal parties by a vote of 2,350,000 to 243,900.

The proposal was for an alliance based on a "short term program aiming at fulfillment of labor's foreign policy, preservation of democratic institutions and improvement of the position of workers."

FORMER OREGONIAN IN MAINE RACE

LOVELL, Me., June 1.—(AP)—Major George C. Cox, retired farmer and former mayor of Stanfield, Ore., announced his candidacy today for the 1940 republican nomination for U. S. representative in the first Maine district, a post now held by Rep. James C. Oliver, (R) of South Portland.

Oliver, an avowed Townsendite, is generally expected to seek re-nomination.

ELK SOFT-BALLERS WIN OVER HEELS

League Leaders in New Caps Down Bruton's Boys 5 to 2.

The league-leading Elks soft-ball team, resplendent in new blue and white caps and jerseys, turned in its fifth straight victory last night by turning back Bruton Heels, 5 to 2, in a well-played, tight ball game. A big third inning rally during which the Elks sluggers smashed out four hits, which coupled with a walk and an infield bobbie, accounted for all five runs and eventually the game.

The Heels drew first blood, however, in the second inning on hits by Miles, Sindt and Heinz, mixed in with two infield outs and a long fly to score their only runs. Ed Sindt, Heel pitcher, settled down after the fatal third, and pitched good ball for the losers, allowing only three scattered hits in the last three innings.
