IS HANDED RIFLE UNSEEN 40 YEARS

THANKSFORT, Ind., June 1.—(AP)—Waiting in a rifle squad to fire a salute to a soldier dead, Charles E. Eads glanced at the stock of the gun heathed to him and saw his own initials carved there.

The rifle was the one he had used with the U. S. forces in the Philippine Insurrection 40 years ago. It was the first time he had seen it since.

Investigation disclosed the gun was in a consignment of obsolete rifles given by the government in 1925 to the local camp of the United Spanish War Veterans.

RAISING SQUALUS SLOW, HARD TASK

PORTSMOUTH, N. H., June 1.—(AP)—Asserting he was satisfied with the progress of salvage work on the sunken submarine Squalus, Rear Admiral C. W. Cole said today it was important the public realize "this necessarily is a slow, tedious task."

In charge of the work since the Squalus sank a week ago Tuesday, the admiral declared the work was proceeding according to routine, with efforts now underway to blow out 600 tons of water from the water-filled compartments which house the 24 dead.

The forward sections of the submarine already have been placed under air pressure and when buoyancy is induced into the remainder of the craft pontoons will be brought out for the actual raising process.

For every 10 minutes of work by a diver under the 40 fathoms of water, there is 45 minutes of "dead" time, while the diver is being lowered and raised.

James H. McDonald, master diver, agreed the task would be slow but added: "We'll get her up."

PILOT INJURED IN FORCED LANDING

PLAINFIELD, Ind., June 1.—(AP)—A U. S. Navy pilot was injured slightly and six other persons were shaken today in a forced landing of the twin-motored navy plane Anacostia on a muddy field two miles northwest of here.

The injured man is George W. Dunn, pilot of the ship, en route from Washington to San Diego, Calif. He is attached to the naval flying field in Washington.

Dunn was treated for cuts by a local physician and placed in an automobile which continued toward Indianapolis.

Michael Wodarysk, pilot, said he lost the blind landing radio beam while attempting to land at Indianapolis municipal airport.

TWO NAVY FLIERS DIE IN CRACK-UP

PENSACOLA, Fla., June 1.—(AP)—Two fliers from the naval air station here were killed today when their training plane plunged into Pensacola bay. Navy officials identified the men as Joseph S. Fox, 34, Seattle, lieutenant junior grade naval reserve, flight instructor.

Alfred Peter Ivy, 23, Norfolk, Va., aviation machinist's mate, student at the air station's training school.

The pilot of another plane aloft at the time alighted and made futile attempts to rescue them.

SUGAR IMPORTER HELD FOR FRAUD

NEW YORK, June 1.—(AP)—Carlos Garcia, a prominent sugar importer, acknowledged in the police lineup today a charge of grand larceny made against him for the theft of \$1,070,427 was "partially true," but contended he did not himself receive the money.

He told acting Lieutenant James Pile it went to his firm.

Assistant District Attorney Frank A. F. Severance said the 45-year-old defendant admitted he obtained the money through falsified warehouse receipts to cover his losses in sugar futures trading and cancellation of customer orders.

Garcia, a corporation, of which Garcia is president, went into receivership May 24 when the National Sugar Refining company, American Sugar Refining company and a lightering firm, Lee & Simpson, told federal court more than \$100,000 was due them and that the Garcia concern's liabilities exceeded assets by more than \$1,000,000.

Besides the companies which obtained the receivership, Severance said six other firms were losers including Paine, Webber and company.

BRITISH RULERS ENJOY BRIEF REST

King and Queen to Start Eastward Trip Friday.

JARPER, Alta., June 1.—(AP)—King George and Queen Elizabeth will rest for 24 hours here on top of the Canadian Rockies when the 400 square miles of the world's largest national park and game sanctuary spread over mighty peaks, canyons, mountain valleys, rushing rivers and glacial grandeur unlike anything on the continent.

From the Pacific shore where Vancouver and Victoria completed the tribute of homage and fealty of the trans-Canadian trip, the British sovereigns moved back to their royal train for the return trip which runs over a route to the north of the westward journey.

Few stops will be made between here and Ontario, Edmonton, capital of Alberta, will entertain her sovereigns six hours on Friday and Saskatchewan will have a two-hour visit Saturday.
