

REFUGEE CHILDREN ENTRY OPPOSED

WASHINGTON, May 31.—(AP)—John Thomas Taylor, legislative representative of the American Legion, told the house immigration committee today proposed legislation to admit 20,000 refugee children from Germany was "an effort to break down existing immigration laws."

On behalf of the ex-servicemen's organization, he opposed any relaxation of existing barriers, "no matter how sympathetic we may be to the children who would be benefited."

"If this is sincere legislation," he continued, "if the real purpose is to help these children, the matter can be handled by giving them preference within the regular immigration quotas this year and next."

F. W. Buck, who said he represented the "defenders of the constitution," told the committee he feared proposed admission of German refugee children would create "more opposition" in this country to Jews.

HAVANA, May 31.—(AP)—Cuban authorities today placed 25 policemen aboard the German liner St. Louis to prevent suicides among 519 Jewish refugees denied permission to enter Cuba.

Captain Schroeder asked for police aid saying hundreds of the refugees had threatened to take their own lives before the liner sailed rather than return to Germany.

JURY SCORES USE OF STATE VEHICLES

OLYMPIA, May 31.—(AP)—The Thurston county grand jury excoriated the "inexcusable and unlawful use" of state-owned automobiles and gasoline on other than state business, in a report filed with the county's superior court judges today.

The jury warned it would "observe with interest" what steps are to be taken by the state to curb the practices.

"The jury has heard many complaints relating to the use of state automobiles and gasoline, especially automobiles by state employees for their own personal benefit and not on state business," the report stated.

The veniremen concluded: "We do not feel the problem is incapable of solution, and we recommend something be done right away. We shall observe with interest during the weeks of recess soon to follow this report, as to what will be done about this inexcusable and unlawful use of state property."

LABOR DELEGATES INCLUDE NO C.I.O.

WASHINGTON, May 31.—(AP)—President Roosevelt appointed today an American delegation to the international labor conference at Geneva including three representatives of the American Federation of Labor and none from the C.I.O.

The labor delegate named on recommendation by the labor department, was Robert J. Watt, American Federation of Labor, Washington. Two advisers appointed to serve with him were Daniel J. Tobin, president of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters, Chauffeurs, Stablemen and Helpers, Indianapolis, Ind., and Herbert Woods, economist, International Union of Operating Engineers, Washington, D. C.

The president also appointed two government delegates, and one employer delegate.

The delegation, except Watt, it was announced, sailed today aboard the liner Manhattan. The session convenes at Geneva, Switzerland, June 8. Watt had sailed earlier.

Other members of the delegation: Assistant Secretary of Labor Charles V. McLaughlin and Carter Goodrich, United States labor commissioner at Geneva, government delegates.

Henry I. Harriman, chairman of the board, New England Power association, Boston, Mass., employer delegate.

STRIKE ORDER ON BUS LINES STAYED

SAN FRANCISCO, May 31.—(AP)—The Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen announced today it would withhold strike action against the Pacific Greyhound bus lines after it was advised the national labor relations board planned to file court action against the company on a contempt charge.

W. P. Nutter, Cleveland, official representative of the brotherhood, said the 10 a. m. "deadline" passed today without any settlement overtures from the bus company.

"We were advised today officially by the national labor relations board that it will proceed immediately to file a petition in the circuit court of appeals asking that such court hold the Pacific Greyhound line in joint contempt by Nutter and C. P. Randall, general chairman representing the drivers."

W. E. Travis, company president, has stated the company was advised by its attorney the national labor relations board order, directing it to recognize and bargain with the union, was "erroneous and invalid."

He said the company could not obey the order if it would, since it is party to a union contract with an A.F.L. union, the Amalgamated Association of Street, Electric, and Motor Coach Employees, and A.F.L. officials have refused to release it from the contract.

Company officials announced there would be no interruption of service, and the A.F.L. union announced it would supply drivers, if Brotherhood union men walked out.

OIL FIRM'S HEAD BEGINS DUTIES HERE
