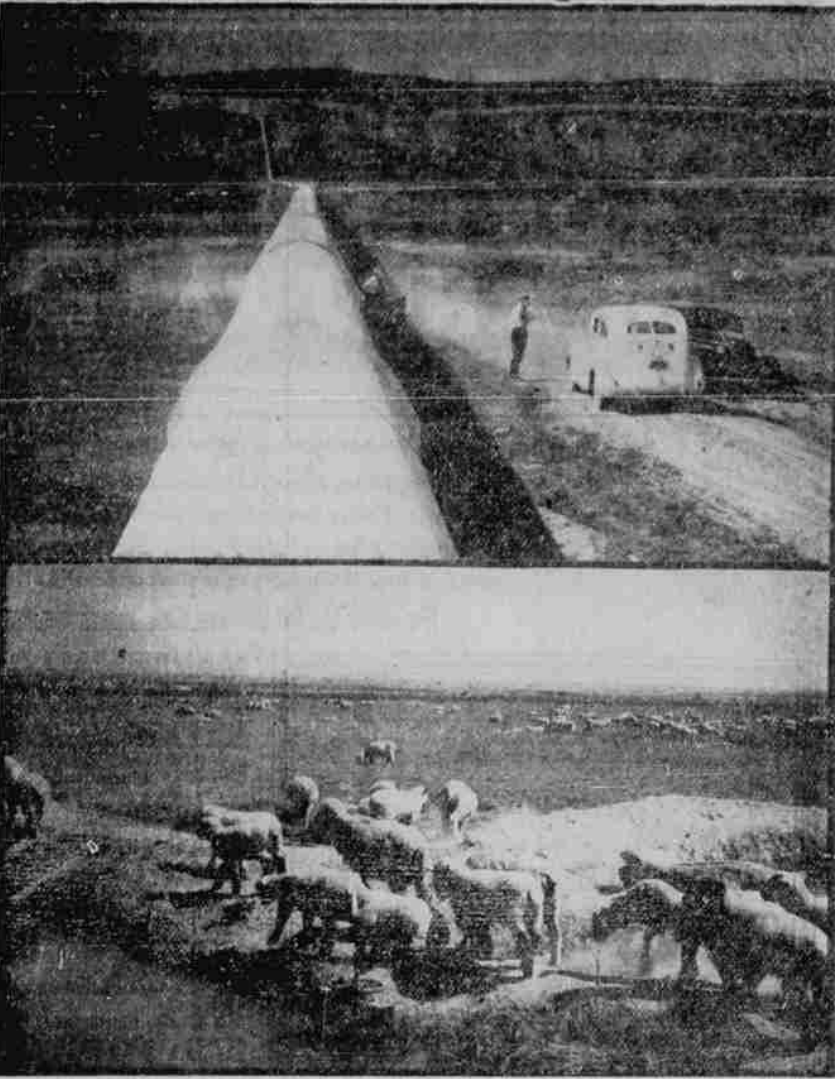

1939 Motor Cruise: Irrigated Oasis

This newspaper is co-operating with the Oregon State Motor association and The Oregonian in presenting a series of motorlogs designed to stimulate travel in Oregon and the Pacific northwest. This article was condensed from a full page article appearing in The Oregonian June 4.

An Oregonian-Oregon State Motor association motorlog party, touring eastern Oregon, found the Ontario-Nyssa-Vale area on the Oregon-Idaho border a verdant paradise compared with the arid central Oregon plateau the party had just traversed on the Central Oregon highway.

Water provided by the Vale-Owyhee reclamation projects has made it possible for scores of farmers, many of them from the dust bowl, to convert sage brush land into fertile farm tracts, and the population of northern Malheur

county is increasing by leaps and bounds as a result.

Claude A. McPherson, secretary of the Ontario Chamber of Commerce, was guide for the party on its tour of the new farms on the bench lands west of Nyssa. He suggested H. L. Sisson would be a good farmer to visit, he having been described as a typical settler who was making a success of his new venture.

Mr. Sisson came to the Owyhee district not quite three years ago from Twin Falls, Idaho, where he previously had farmed irrigated land. He has cleared a large part of his 140 acres, grows hay for a herd of 21 cows, the milk from which he sells to a co-operative creamery at Payette, Idaho. He has done well enough to be able to import a registered German shepherd from Austria and plans to buy a milking machine in the fall.

Sugar beets are an important crop in the Owyhee district since the creation of a large sugar refinery at Nyssa last year. The motorlog party saw many fields of beets, which at the time of the visit were being thinned by large gangs of men and women.

The transformation of sage brush land into farms on a big scale is a revelation to western Oregon people, members of the motorlog party agreed. Good highways lead from Portland to Ontario and a loop trip can be made by traveling the Central Oregon highway one way and the Old Oregon trail and Columbia river highway the other way. By way of Bend and Burns, Ontario is 90 miles from Portland. By way of the Columbia river highway and the Old Oregon trail the distance is 114 miles.
