Sheriff John A. Miller directed 24 deputies with orders to be cautious because he believed Brown was heavily armed and "would put up a fight."

The manhunters went above the cloudline of the mountain, 25 miles east of here, and they said they saw a man running up the slope of the peak.

The mountain is nearly 4,000 feet high. Officers surrounded it on all sides and Sheriff Miller said he believed Brown had no chance to escape.

Sheriff Miller said Brown escaped from the Martinez jail May 28 by sawing bars and jumping 20 feet from a window.
