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GOOD news for the Uniqua valley was in liberal quantity on the front page of this newspaper yesterday.

ITEM: A telegram to the News-Review from U. S. Senator Charles L. McNary announced that the Reconstruction Finance Corporation has approved the loan application of the F. A. Burd cannery. That news means a great deal to the prune growers. It means that the cooperative agreement worked out between the cannery and the growers, for the canning of fresh prunes this season, can be carried out. Previously prune tonnage necessary to a maximum pack had been agreed, working capital, arranged and the grower organization completed. The one problem, unsolved until yesterday, was how to finance the packing of three million pounds of fresh prunes. The amount required was more than could be furnished by the local banks, though the two Roseburg banks are participating with the RFC in the financing. Application was made to the RFC some weeks ago. The loan is granted and there is no major obstacle in the way of a maximum cannery run this season.

Just to relieve the minds of some who may worry that the money mentioned above is new cash or state funds money—some part of it is nothing of that sort. It is strictly a banking deal. Every cent loaned is to be secured by canned prunes in a bonded warehouse. None of the prunes thus pledged will be sold until the RFC bank loan is paid.

ITEM: The Board of Army Engineers in Washington, D. C., has ordered a detail survey of the Uniqua river.

This is the successful termination of a local effort begun nearly two years ago. It was suggested that the Uniqua river be improved so that its use would solve the transportation problem that has held back the development of this valley. In other words the suggestion was that the Uniqua be made navigable for light draft boats and barges as far as Roseburg. Obviously the first step in the consideration of such a proposal is a survey. The thought was not a new one. Since 1876 there has been intermittent agitation along this line.

The last previous effort was in 1916 when a preliminary survey was made from Seaside to Roseburg to determine whether or not navigation should be attempted. In lack of economic need the report of that survey was unfavorable. Local interests asked last year that the 1916 report be reviewed, contending that many important factors had changed since 1916.

The preliminary survey made last year developed the soundness of these local views by recommending a complete and detailed survey. Whether or not the necessary improvements to provide navigation will ever be made depends upon the data compiled as the result of the detail survey. One thing is certain. If the river can reasonably be made to meet our need of transportation, we want to know it. And a complete survey is the only way to get the information.

Again we call attention to the fact that this proposal is not a by-product of the current spending spree. The investigation on which the present study is based began in 1936. The detail survey would have been requested and doubtless would have been made if there never had

been a federal spending program. If the proposal that the Uniqua be navigated is declared a sound one, the improvement will eventually be made in matter what sort of federal administration is in power.

ITEM: The recently passed flood control bill carries an item of \$275,000 for jetty and inner harbor improvements at the mouth of the river. This means another step toward making the port of Uniqua at Randsport a splendid harbor.

It can't be denied that by increasing production she is taking the right way to get what she wants.

THE DALLES PORT RATES ARE FILED

THE DALLES, June 3.—(AP)—Columbia river watertruck freight rates were filed yesterday with the interstate commerce commission by Low Russell, manager of the Shaver Forwarding company.

They will become effective June 28 if approved.

The rates would cover general commodities from Portland to interior Oregon and Washington and Idaho with the port of The Dalles serving as point of exchange from barge to truck.

Shaver barges will ply the Columbia between here and Portland via Bonneville shiplocks, relaying freight east from here via the Chicago Great Lake Consolidated Freightways, inland motor freight, Portland-Pendleton Motor line, Spokane-Pacific, The Dalles-Frontier line and the Sanjour Trail, supplemented by Shaver trucks to reach points not touched by the regular lines of the other lines.

Russell said the rates would be 25 per hundredweight in getting their fruit to a seaport. Corresponding saving would be effected for other commodities.

He said the rates would affect a vast interior region stretching north to Spokane, east to Coeur d'Alene, Lewiston, Moscow and Boise in Idaho, into the John Day valley, to Burns, Bend and intermediate points in Oregon.

Barges will maintain an unbroken schedule handling mainly agricultural and horticultural products, outboard, staples, roofing, cement, drugs and other products inbound.

BRITAIN STARTS PEACETIME DRAFT

LONDON, June 3.—(AP)—Great Britain today started registering the 20-year-old men who are to be called up for military training in the first peacetime conscription in the nation's history.

The labor ministry, in charge of preliminary organization, began today the compulsory recruits at its employment offices, which normally close at noon on Saturdays but today are remaining open until 8:30 p.m.

Notions to men in the required age group to register were published, broadcast and announced on billboards. No machinery has been established to round up possible delinquents. The government is relying on the average citizen's frequent contacts with governmental departments like the post office or the health ministry to disclose any who may fail to register.

Those who pass physical examinations will go before a military interviewing officer who will ascertain their aptitudes and preferences in types of training. The first group of men called, between 1930 and 1936, will get enlistment notices about July 1, telling them to report two weeks later.

Approximately 50,000 conscripts will be summoned at two-month intervals until the year's estimated 200,000 have been called for a projected six months' training.

FORMER CHIEF OF SUPREME COURT ILL

WASHINGTON, June 3.—(AP)—Chief Justice Charles Evans Hughes is suffering from a "chronic ailment," but it was said officially today "there is no reason to doubt his full recovery."

The illness of the 72-year-old chief justice was made known in a statement by Nelson A. Rockefeller, assistant clerk of the court in charge of press relations.

725 TO RECEIVE U. OF O. DEGREES

EUGENE, June 3.—(AP)—Diplomas signifying degrees of bachelor of arts or science or advanced degrees such as doctor of philosophy, doctor of jurisprudence and master of arts or sciences will be presented to approximately 725 students at the University of Oregon at the sixty-second annual commencement exercises, which will be held Sunday night while 25 others will receive certificates in nursing or social work. It was announced here today by Dr. Donald M. Erb, university president, "commencements in the United States Army will also be awarded to 42 students."

The list will include approximately 600 who will receive the bachelor degree, 63 who will receive the degree of doctor of medicine, and about 60 whose advanced study will bring them the masters' degree. The degree of doctor of philosophy, the highest academic degree that can be attained, will be conferred upon one student, and another will receive the doctor of education degree.

Commencement events this year will be crowded into two busy days. Saturday has been designated Alumni day. The ceremonial meeting of the University Alumni association will be held Saturday morning.

The baccalaureate sermon will be delivered Sunday morning at 11 o'clock by Dr. Raymond C. Brooks, of Los Angeles, whose topic will be "The Widening Horizon." The commencement exercises will be held at 2 o'clock. Both will be in McArthur gym. Dr. Erb will talk on "The Debt We Owe" before the graduates.

Class reunions will bring together graduates of 50 years ago, 40 years ago and 25 years ago. Only one member of the 50 year class will be present.
