Seventy Year Old Farm Wife Gets Diploma For High School Work

MANFIELD, Wash., June 3.—(AP)—Seventy years young, Mrs. Jane Grubbs, a wheat rancher's wife, finally has her high school diploma and explains: "You know, I've never been able to learn enough."

The elderly woman who has become a familiar figure on the seven-mile highway from her ranch home here the past four years, either walking or hitch-hiking to school for her special assignments, went on:

"I did it for an example, too. So many young folks spend their time in good halls. They might better be studying."

The Grubbs have no children of their own. But the 12 other school graduates, between the ages of 15 and 18, and the school board and the rest of the audience rattled the auditorium windows with applause last week, when she stepped to the platform for her diploma.

It's been one of her regrets, she said later, that house-keeping and other tasks on her husband's 1,000-acre wheat ranch kept her from watching their school activities, or cheering the school's teams. There wasn't time.

As a girl, she received the equivalent of a high school education and two normal school diplomas in Quebec, Canada. She came here in 1906 to teach and met and married Frank Grubbs two years later. Several years ago, she decided she wanted an American high school diploma.

"Schools don't teach enough practical subjects yet," she believes. "The greatest trouble with colleges is that they teach so much one doesn't need."

"Schools should train persons to work for themselves and to start their own businesses, even small ones, too."
