maintenance of the building in return for the lease privilege during the first year.

Concessions Given Lodge
Rights to close certain streets, hold parades and direct traffic during the forthcoming state convention of the Eagles lodge were granted upon application by Dr. H. E. Seinfeld, convention chairman, and Wally Rapp, incoming master of the local lodge. The lodge, the council was told, will close Pine street, between Cass and Lane streets, adjoining convention headquarters. Streets in the vicinity of Finlay field, where outdoor events are to be staged, will be closed to parking during those events. The usual Thursday night band concert, scheduled for June 29, the opening day of the convention, will be moved to Finlay field, where it will be presented prior to an open air flight card, the council was told.

Contribution Studied
A request that the city of Roseburg contribute \$250 toward the newly organized Pacific Highway association, was taken under consideration after being presented by H. O. Pargeter, chairman of the local committee on association membership. Councilmen agreed that the appropriation is justified, but the matter was reserved for a study of city finances to determine whether the amount can safely be apportioned at the present time.

Upon a petition from property owners in the block on Jackson street between Cass and Lane streets the council voted to extend the one-hour parking restriction to that block, and city attorney B. L. Eddy was instructed to prepare the required ordinance.

The street committee was instructed to make improvements to the airport entrance road. A remonstrance was received from the county court against an order from the council that a sidewalk along county owned land on Mosier street, adjoining the S. P. tracks, be rebuilt. The county's remonstrance charged that the city was negligent in allowing heavily loaded trucks to drive across the sidewalk, thereby causing it to break down. Chief of Police John Luer, on the other hand told the council the property was rented by the county to wood haulers and was used as a wood yard, the trucks crossing the walk with the county's permission. The matter was placed in the hands of the city attorney.

Street Signals Discussed
A communication was received from K. D. Lytle, division engineer for the state highway department, stating that the council's request for a study on the matter of traffic lights had been referred to the state traffic engineer. The council at a previous meeting had requested a study of the advisability of installing stop-and-go signals at Oak and Cass streets on the highway. Mr. Lytle said that in his opinion the lights were not justified and that they would be more hindrance than help in the matter of traffic safety, particularly unless strict measures were taken to force pedestrians to observe the signals. He said, however, the matter would be given further study.

A petition asking for the vacation of the strip reserved for sidewalks on both sides of Overlook avenue was held for further investigation. It was pointed out that a sewer line and water main are located in the parking space on the south side of the pavement and vacation of the parking and sidewalk strip might result in future difficulty.

A petition from S. S. Robinson to vacate several lots in the southwest section of town was approved and notice of vacation ordered published. Transfer of the beer license at the Monogram Clear store to William DeBolt, new owner, was approved.

A request for installation of a street light at the alley off Cass street between Pine and Stephens streets, to accommodate the new quarters of the Salvation Army was referred to the street committee. The following bills were ordered paid:

ness aboard the liner Flandre and 141 aboard the British steamer Orana. Both of these ships also have been refused permission to land their refugee-passengers in Havana and are seeking other Latin American havens.

Bernson's offer of \$443,000 included a \$200,000 deposit in the National City bank of New York \$40,000 subscribed by the refugees themselves, and his promise he would try to raise the balance—\$203,000—from New York Jewish aid organizations.

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
