

SALVATION ARMY QUARTERS OPENED

A dedication service and open-house was held at the new Salvation Army headquarters 223 Cass St. over the Tom Parkinson food store last night with Major R. M. Elberhart from Portland officiating.

Representatives from various civic groups and members of the Salvation Army advisory board were present. This board is composed of business men interested in the organization who are in a position to give counsel and advice to the officers in charge of the work and represent, quoting Major Elberhart, "a cross-section of the life of Roseburg."

MEXICAN FLIER KILLED IN CRASH

WASHINGTON, June 7.—(AP)—Francisco Sarabia, Mexican aviator who recently broke the non-stop record from Mexico City to New York, was killed today in taking off from Bolting field, on a visit to his mother at Ciudad Lerdo, Durango.

His wife and their ten-year-old son, Francisco, Jr., who were watching the takeoff with members of the Mexican embassy staff, saw him fall.

Four minutes after leaving the ground, the plane fell.

Lieut. Commander Manuel Guerrero and Dr. Luis Quintanilla of the Mexican embassy staff swam in it in the hope that Sarabia was still alive.

After two hours a crane hauled in the ship which the young flier had dubbed "Conquistador Del Cielo"—The Sky Conqueror. His body was inside.

An army doctor expressed the opinion Sarabia's neck was broken when the plane fell.

even feared to deny the charges. Senator Burke (D., Neb.), a frequent critic of the labor act and the board, interrupted the Oregon senator to say there was no basis for this fear.

"Just because a person or firm asserts what it believes to be its right, does not mean it is going to be treated unfairly by the board," Burke said. "I'm willing to defend the board against that."

"Well, at least the fear exists," Holman replied.

Oregon Concern Mentioned
Chairman Madden had mentioned the Portland company when he testified in support of a bill to outlaw "oppressive labor practices." He said investigations of the national labor board showed some 50 firms had used industrial espionage.

In the letter Roy T. Bishop, president of the Oregon Wooded company, expressed surprise at Madden's charge and added: "I don't know where Mr. Madden got the information to support such a statement as far as the Oregon Wooded company is concerned."

"Not a red cent has ever been spent for any secret service," Bishop said, adding, "I don't know that it would do us any good to have you use the foregoing for we are still under fire of the board and anything we do is going to be used against us, which will add fuel to our annoyance and expense."

The worried company head suggested Senator Holman show the letter to Governor Martin of Oregon, who has urged revision of the labor act in Washington.

Bishop said his firm was affiliated with the National Association of Manufacturers, the National Wood Manufacturers association, and the Portland chamber of commerce and he was "quite certain none of these employ any spies and if they do such service has never been offered to us, nor have we used it."

YINING, Minn., June 7.—(AP)—Alvin Rex, 21-year-old farmer, calmly told Sheriff J. C. Henkes early today how he shot and killed his father and mother and possibly, fatally wounded a 13-year-old brother, Carl, after an argument yesterday over an estate.

"It's a bad thing," the sheriff quoted him as saying, "but I just got mad and decided to kill them all and he was with it."

GIFTS TO U. OF O. TOTAL HUGE SUM

EUGENE, June 7.—(AP)—Gifts in cash, materials and supplies totaling more than a million dollars were received by the University of Oregon and the Oregon medical school during the past year, it has been announced from the campus.

Actual cash value of gifts, appraised reached \$951,577, but other material, much of which was of great aid to the institutions but on which no sum was set, would easily raise the total over the million mark.

Of the total, the medical school received \$825,539, and the university at Eugene received \$418,541. The United States government was the largest contributor, and through its agencies of public works administration, works progress administration and national youth administration, allotted a total of \$450,180. Of this the medical school received \$255,931 and the university at Eugene \$234,249.

FAMOUS FILM ACTOR DEAD AT AGE OF 77

NANTUCKET, Mass., June 7.—(AP)—George D. Fawcett, 77, famed as a character actor on stage and screen for nearly a half century, died at his home last night.

After a long stage career, which began in 1886, Fawcett went to Hollywood and appeared in character roles with Greta Garbo, John Barrymore and other leading stars. Robert Wilson, his son-in-law, said death was caused by a heart ailment from which Fawcett had suffered for two years. He collapsed last year in Providence, R. I., while starting on a spending tour but apparently had been on the road to recovery until stricken last night.

He's Not Fooling Her

BRITISH AND JAPS SQUABBLE SERIOUS

SHANGHAI, June 7.—(AP)—The death of a British citizen of injuries inflicted by Japanese marines created a serious situation today.

Japanese charged the Englishman, R. M. Tinkler who formerly was inspector of municipal police here, fired upon a Japanese officer and threatened his men when they entered a British cotton mill in the Pootung district to stop a fight between strikers and non-strikers.

"This case is not a mere issue involving pointing a gun by a Briton at Japanese," a Japanese embassy spokesman declared. "It involves lawlessness towards a Japanese officer in uniform. That Japanese marines should have disregarded Tinkler and manhandled him is explicable under the circumstances."

"We are surprised he was not shot and killed on the spot," British privately charged the Japanese misrepresented the facts, British officials made no statement but were investigating.

Adding to British resentment was the fact Tinkler was taken to the Shanghai general hospital in Japanese-dominated Hongkew, rather than to a hospital in the international settlement.

The party stopped 24 minutes at Windsor last night, where perhaps 500,000 Americans from Detroit and nearby sectors joined thousands of Canadians in cheering their majesties.

Members of the Detroit city council were official guests. Detroit's own welcome was a sign 45 feet long and 12 feet high. "Detroit welcomes their majesties the king and queen."

Full information sent. "It is manifestly impossible to impose guarantees on states which do not desire it," Chamberlain declared.

The envoy, he said, would be instructed to ask the British Ambassador in Moscow to inform the Russian government on the attitude of the British government on all outstanding points.

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"It is possible to imagine action in which any one of the three governments might feel its security was indirectly menaced by the action of another European power."

"These cases have been reviewed in detail and I hope it may be possible now to suggest a formula acceptable to the three governments which, while having regard to the interests of other states, will ensure cooperation between these powers in resistance to aggression."
