

SUMMER CAMP FOR GIRLS ARRANGED

Campfire Organization to Frolic at Wolf Creek in Latter Part of July.

Definite plans have been completed by the Campfire board for the two weeks' summer camp out for girls belonging to the Campfire organization, Mrs. Clair K. Allen, president of the board, announced today. The camp is to be held at Wolf creek, July 16 to 30. Facilities of the former Wolf Creek CCC camp will be made available.

Pre-registration will be held June 12 to 17 at the office of the Roseburg chamber of commerce. The registration fee will be \$1. Final registration will be July 14. Medical examination reports must be not more than three days prior to July 16.

A charge of \$5 per week will be made for board, with an additional 50 cents for archery tackle and 25 cents for handicraft supplies.

Miss Dorothy Dale Jackson will act as camp director and also teach hand crafts.

Nature lore will be taught by Miss Margaret Carr, and Mrs. Earl Ulrich will teach archery.

Swimming will be one of the main activities this year, and the board, Mrs. Allen reports, feels it has been very fortunate in securing Miss Barbara Kurtz of Salem as instructor. Miss Kurtz is a licensed Red Cross swimming instructor and was highly recommended to the board.

Mrs. Archie Taylor will be in charge of the kitchen.

Mrs. Clair K. Allen, Mrs. Roy O. Young and Mrs. W. T. Peters will be in camp for the two weeks and will act as counselors for the girls. It is also probable that some of the other guardians will attend.

POSTAL WORKER HAS A UNIQUE HOBBY

BEND, June 8.—(AP)—John Bell, postoffice worker, filed Eugene's millionth postoffice money order today among his collection of 600 others from cities in almost every part of the United States.

Bell, who specializes in money orders from county seats, considers his Eugene prize—the order was for one cent but it cost him seven—merely a fine specimen of his game.

"I've bagged far more interesting ones in my hunt for county seat orders," he added.

Bell's hobby is pretty costly. There are 3199 county seats in the United States. The average cost for each collection is 12 cents—one for the order, six for fees and the rest for postage.

NEW BAKERY LAW EFFECTIVE JUNE 14

SALEM, June 8.—(AP)—Applications for licenses under the new bakery law were sent out today by the state department of agriculture, which will take over the abolished bakery board's functions.

The law requires the licensing of bakers and of distributors of bakery products. Bakers employing three persons or less must pay \$5 license fees, while other bakers will pay \$10 a year. Distributors will pay \$5 annually. The fees permit both bakers and distributors to use one truck, but additional trucks are to be licensed at \$2 per year each.

The law becomes effective next Wednesday.

The department will inspect bakers and the equipment of distributors for sanitation. Licenses, which must be renewed each January 1, will be issued only after the department's sanitary inspection.

MANY DEFECTS NOTED

Eight hundred twenty-seven cars with defects were involved in traffic accidents in the state of Oregon during the first four months of 1939, Earl Snell, secretary of state, said today. These defects ranged from faulty brakes and improper lights to defective steering gears and other mechanical faults.

FRIED PINEAPPLE RINGS

1 cup flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon sugar
1 egg, beaten
2 cups milk
1/2 cup pineapple juice
1/2 cup Crisco
1 cup of pineapple rings (9 to 10 slices)
