The world champion New York Yankees at last know what it is like to have a shakeup. Alarmed at the team equalling its worst slump of the season—two losses in a row—Manager Joe McCarthy took typically drastic action.

He not only benched one man, but he switched the sixth and seventh men in the batting order.

The effect was instantaneous. Joe Di Maggio, making his first appearance in centerfield for the champions in more than a month, hit a triple to bring in a run in his first time at bat and the Yankees were away to a 5-2 victory over the Chicago White Sox.

At the time he injured his right leg in a game April 29, Di Maggio had hit safely in seven consecutive contests and had an average of .455. In three recent appearances as a pinch-hitter he doubled once with the bases loaded and twice was walked.

Although he got no other hits yesterday, his reputation still was good enough to get him an intentional pass in the fifth inning, filling the bases and flaring in the three-run rally which was New York's margin of victory. Gomez earned his fourth triumph of the season.
