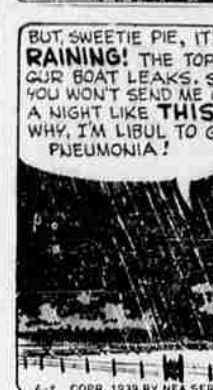

ROOSEVELT WILL DELAY COAST TRIP

WASHINGTON, June 8.—(AP)—President Roosevelt said today he had decided against starting a trip to the west coast June 15. At a press conference, Mr. Roosevelt explained he wanted to stay in Washington to keep check and see legislation was passed by June 30 providing more relief funds and extending expiring "nuisance" taxes. The reason for postponing the trip, he said, was a very simple one; he had not received sufficient assurances congress would not adjourn by July 15.

Mr. Roosevelt asserted the relief machinery would start operating at midnight June 30 unless another appropriation were approved and the bill signed by him before that time.

Collection of excise taxes which expire on that date also would stop without extension legislation.

He made the last remark with a smile.

DON'T TOUCH FAWNS, GAME BOARD ASKS

The fawning season is now at hand and the game department again makes the request that individuals running across fawn deer in the woods leave them alone, as in practically all cases the fawns found are not in danger of starvation. It is the habit of the old doe to hide its fawn and leave it while she feeds, and the fawn usually lies quietly in the brush alongside of a log until its mother returns. Fawns when very young are more or less shaky and give the impression of being weak and starved but if left untouched, will be cared for by the doe deer. Numerous requests for permits to keep young fawns are received annually, and while for the fee of one dollar the game department will issue a permit under justifiable circumstances, it is up to the individual to prove to the satisfaction of the investigating officer that the fawn would have died if not rescued. Therefore, unless there is actual evidence that the mother deer is dead, the young fawns should not be touched. Most of the buck deer become mean and dangerous in the fall of the year and as it is not possible to release a deer after it once has been domesticated, it becomes necessary to have many of them killed to prevent injury to human life.

COAST BUILDING PERMITS INCREASE

SAN FRANCISCO, June 8.—(AP)—Pacific coast builders last month hammered away at new records for virtually a decade.

They knocked out permits totaling more than \$17,000,000 in May in the coast's 10 largest cities, the Associated Press wire survey showed today.

It was the second month in the last three to go over the 17 million mark—and also the second in the past nine years.

March permits, totaling \$17,505,000, and May with \$17,173,000, were the last months since 1930.

Permits for the first five months of this year moved up to \$71,774,000 or more than \$11,000,000 ahead of last year.

That gain of virtually one-fourth over last year, and around \$10,000,000 over the former mark for this decade made in 1937, was the more heartening to business in general because of the influence of this great industry on the general economic status of the coast states.

Most business along the Pacific has been coasting along a little ahead of the 1938 gait but slower than in 1937.

Seattle, San Francisco and Spokane doubled permits of May last year and had ample room to spare, while Los Angeles, Long Beach, Oakland, Portland and Tacoma chalked up increases. San Diego and Sacramento lagged for the month, but still had a large number of new jobs and a big carry-over from preceding months.

Spokane had the largest number of permits for any month in its history.

BEER LICENSE DENIED

Application for a wholesaler's beer license made by Clyde S. Slocum for the Cy Slocum Distributing company, Roseburg, was yesterday refused by the state liquor control commission. The application was

rejected on the grounds it was not demanded by public interest or convenience.

TAX LIENS STRIKE EX-CAPONE AIDES

CHICAGO, June 8.—(AP)—Federal income tax liens totaling \$628,707.71 were filed today against John (Jack) Guzik, one time "business manager" of the Al Capone gang, by Internal Revenue Collector Carter H. Harrison.

The liens, filed in federal district court, showed a tax claim of \$503,190.10 for the years of 1924 to 1928, inclusive, and interests of \$125,597.61.

Harrison simultaneously filed liens showing claims for taxes, penalties and interest on distilled spirits against Hymie (Loudmouth) Levin, reputed former collector for the Capone gang and one object of State's Attorney Thomas J. Courtney's war against handbooks, totaling \$151,968.52. These liens showed a tax claim of \$119,367, a five per cent penalty of \$5,968.35 and interest of \$26,633.17.
