RECREATION NEWS

Douglas County Conditions Summarized in Forestry Service Bulletin.

North Umpqua District Fishing: At Steamboat the North Umpqua river has fallen approximately 6 inches during the past 7 days. Trout fishing is reported to be improving, with good fly water becoming more accessible. Fair jack salmon fishing is reported from the Idley and Steamboat areas. An 8-pound fresh-run steelhead was taken at Idley Thursday, the first reported for the season. The smaller tributary streams are moderately low and crystal clear and should offer excellent fly fishing while the weather remains clear.

Roads: The roads are in good condition. The North Umpqua is open to the new bridge above Ilabe, and work is progressing above that point.

Accommodations: This district is replete with improved forest camps and pleasant camping spots, both along the North Umpqua and Little rivers. The North Umpqua lodge at Steamboat is open June 15. All cabins are already reserved for that date. Idley dining room and cabins are open now.

Bohemia District Fishing: All streams are low and clear. Fishing is reported to be a little improved, with salmon clusters yielding good catches.

Roads: All roads are open but somewhat rutted in places. There are still a few drifts of snow to be seen around Fairview lookout, which can be reached via the Brice creek road.

Camps: Rujada forest camp is a fine quiet camp for use, although a few visitors have been camping there. Swimming should prove attractive with the advent of the first sunny days.

Diamond Lake District Fishing: Fishing at Diamond lake is reported to be spotty—good one day and only fair the next. Stream fishing is still reported as fair. Mosquitoes are quite bothersome at Kelsay valley, and are becoming increasingly numerous at the lake, although not yet severe.

Roads: The Cascade lakes road is now open to Kelsay valley—closed beyond that point. All other roads are open, including the North Umpqua road west from Big Camas to Snuff camp, approximately 3 miles from Copeland creek. In case of rain this road will be closed to travel.

South Umpqua District Fishing: A party which came out from Fish and Buckeye lakes June 9 reported the fishing as very good. Stream fishing is reported to be only fair.

Roads: All roads open and in good condition.

FOURTH TRY WITH 'LUNG' SUCCESSFUL

BIRKENHEAD, Eng., June 9.—(AP)—Frank Shaw, one of four survivors of the Theta submarine disaster, was quoted today as saying he had volunteered to try the Davis "lung" escape apparatus after three others who attempted to use it were hauled, dead, back into the submarine.

R. S. Johnson, a director of Cammell Laird, builders of the Theta, quoted Shaw as saying only those in the best physical condition could try to escape because it involved a steep climb up the interior of the Theta at a 42 degree angle.

"Shaw told me he was feeling pretty bad at that point and his breathing was very bad," Johnson said.

"When those three poor fellows were taken back dead into the submarine from the escape chamber, I think it made the others nervous," Johnson added. Shaw had "suffered terribly and could scarcely speak."

He described an "absurd" reports work had been suspended on three other submarines.

"This disaster was caused only by an accident from outside or some human slip," he said, "that in all the difference there is between tragedy and success."
