DR. G. C. BELLINGER IS GUEST SPEAKER AT HEALTH ASSOCIATION DINNER

The annual meeting of the Douglas County Public Health association was held in the basement of the Methodist church Tuesday evening, June 6. A potluck dinner was served to approximately 60 people, members being present from Lookingslass, Melrose, Glide and Kellogg, in addition to Roseburg.

The president of the association, Thomas C. Hartfield, presided at a short business session. The following officers for the ensuing year were elected: President, Thomas C. Hartfield; vice president, Mrs. R. H. Mercer; secretary, Mrs. G. M. Krell, and treasurer, Mrs. Ray Peterson. Although complete figures on the membership drive are not yet available, a tentative report of 150 members to date was given by Mrs. Earl Wiley, Mr. Hartfield then introduced Dr. A. N. Johnson, recently appointed public health officer, who discussed briefly the meaning of public health. Miss Harriett Breckenstall, field consultant in tuberculosis nursing from the state board of health, was also present to the group, as well as the members of the local health unit staff.

Dr. G. C. Bellinger, superintendent of the Oregon State Tuberculosis hospital at Salem, was the speaker of the evening. Dr. Bellinger spoke of tuberculosis being a peculiarly treacherous and insidious disease, being known since earliest history. It, like yellow fever, could be completely stamped out. There have been tremendous reductions in the prevalence of communicable disease in the last twenty years. For instance, typhoid has been reduced 90 per cent, diphtheria 87 per cent, and tuberculosis 70 per cent. The prevalence of tuberculosis varies according to the sanitary conditions and community intelligence. There are 699 cases per 100,000 in
