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WELL, the United States is not
worrying and streamlining its
military forces. The great lines of
transport and kitchen, gun, range-
finder and searchlight trucks which
are a summer sight on our high-
ways, when the army is maneuver-
ing, are patterned after the new
European military design.

But our highways are not.
Particularly our Pacific highway
across this southern Oregon moun-
tain barrier area is not. And this is
the strategic link between the popu-
lation areas of the north and the
south Pacific coast.

This link will take some \$5,000,
000 to construct on a modern mili-
tary and commercial highway
alignment and grade. Twenty
years' work by the State Highway
Commission probably.

If the president's proposed mili-
tary highway plan goes through
congress, the highway department
sees a chance to build the Pacific
highway now. The Pacific highway
is designated as one of the four
north-south military roads,
which with three cross-continental
military roads would form the mili-
tary transportation grid.

That is our chance to get the
Grants Pass-Roseburg bottleneck of
the Pacific highway rebuilt to mili-
tary and heavy commercial speci-
fications very soon.

A chance too good to miss.
With Oregon's highway depart-
ment apparently preparing to swing
support for the federal Bureau of
Public Roads and President Roose-
velt's military highway project, that
project takes on a local importance
in Grants Pass that the earlier fed-
eral toll highway plan did not merit.

The highway department was a-
gainst the plan to build a grid of
great high-speed toll highways
across the country on entirely new
routes that would have avoided
every town and city.

For one thing, people would have
objected to paying toll on any high-
way that followed older tax-built
highways even partially. So the toll
highways would have had to be
entirely new across such difficult
terrain that their excessive cost
would have been greater than the
possible tolls could have maintain-
ed.

The new military highway plan
is different, and perhaps is suggest-
ed by the great network of military
highways that serves Germany to-
day. It radiates out of Berlin in all
directions toward Germany's sur-
rounding borders, and offers instan-
taneous passage without traffic
jams or delays for Germany's army
and artillery forces and supplies,
now motorized to key into the
highway system. (From an editorial

Detroit First Sacker Again
On Trail of Mark Set
by Babe Ruth.
