

NOTED CHOIR WILL SING IN ROSEBURG

The a cappella choir of Cascade college, Portland, Oregon, will be presented in a sacred concert at the Methodist Episcopal church in Roseburg, June 16 at 8 o'clock. The group is just completing a California tour, which included Los Angeles and the San Francisco Golden Gate exposition, where it represented the Portland Rose festival.

The choir has toured extensively throughout the Pacific northwest, giving programs in the major cities of Oregon, Washington, British Columbia and Idaho. Capacity audiences have heard and appreciated their renditions. The program contains selections from some of the best known composers, among whom may be found Mozart, Brahms, Grieg, Tschernof and Christiansen.

Willard R. Hallman, director of the choir, is a graduate of the Westminster Choir school of Princeton, N. J. and is head of the music department of Cascade college, formerly Portland Bible institute. This institution is an interdenominational Christian college, and has thirteen denominations, eight states and a Canadian province represented in its student body. The music department offers courses leading for service area pastors' assistants, capable of directing a comprehensive music program on the level of true musicianship.

NATION'S 4-H TO MEET THIS WEEK

WASHINGTON, June 13.—(AP)—More than 200 boys and girls from rural sections will discuss problems confronting the nation's 4-H clubs and how "to make the best better" in a week's convention to be held here starting Thursday.

Four delegates, two boys and two girls, have been selected from each of 12 states. The same states will send 59 leaders to participate in the discussions. Oregon is sending only two girls.

Arizona, California, Nevada, Utah and Idaho are the only states which will not be represented. Puerto Rico will send one delegate and two leaders.

Each of the delegates is engaged in some project designed to demonstrate a better way of performing some task related to farming or homemaking. In "learning by doing" they raise pigs, plant and care for gardens, learn to sew, raise livestock, poultry, crops, preserve food and follow scientific farming methods.

The delegates are outstanding club members of their states, who have attained their rank by excellent work. Those from Oregon are: Marjorie Jensen and Helen Michael, route two, Eugene.

The leader from the state is Mrs. Edna S. Mitchell.

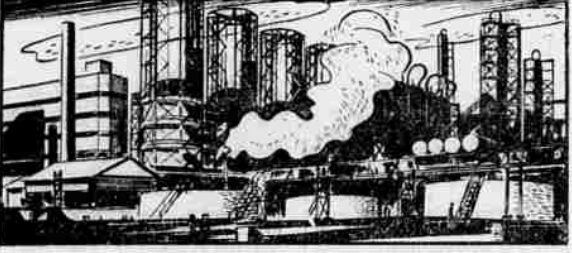
