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MOST of us know very little about the hotel business in our own town. We seldom have occasion to patronize the hotels in our own town though we know quite a lot about hotels in some other cities where we have chanced to stop while traveling.

But the truth is that the hotel business in the United States is truly big business. It rates seventh in the list of industrial volume in the country. And it is big business in every town and city in the whole land.

Lately the hotel business has been beset by a new, somewhat serious competition. The roadside places of business that formerly were simply called "auto camps" have been dressed up, fixed up, and refurbished and now are known variously as motor courts, motor hotels and the latter name has been shortened to be simply "motel"—a new word in the language, if it sticks and becomes common usage.

At first glance this type of competition looks as though it might spell doom for the regular hotel business. Relatively, less investment is required and the appeal is to the motor traveler and most travel is by motor these days.

However, there is an offset to the rise in this type of competition. Tourist business is increasing, though its increase is not as rapid as the increased facilities along the highway. Furthermore, the better motor courts, the more the traveling public is educated to the use of first class accommodations.

One more thought on the subject of hotels and hotel work: The dollars that the hotels take in are always new dollars for distribution in the community. The only thing the hotel operators can do with the dollars they take in is spend most of them for the various costs that enter into the operation of their establishments.
