

SEATTLE REDUCES LOS ANGELES LEAD

Rainiers Win 3-to-1 Battle; Seals Slaughter Beavers by 16-to-8 Score.

A timely single by White that enabled Seattle to close in on the league-leading Los Angeles Angels and Portland's vain effort to stem a 26-hit attack by the San Francisco Seals made news in the Pacific Coast baseball league today.

White's single in the seventh scored two runs at Seattle last night to give Seattle a 3-to-1 win over the Angels, trimming the Los Angeles lead to a game and a half.

All the runs were scored in the seventh. The Angels failed their sole run when Bob Collins singled, advanced, and came home on a single by Mayo. In the Rainier half, two men were out when Lawrence and Gyselman singled in turn and Hunt walked to fill the bases. Then came White's sharp single to bring in the winning runs.

It was a tightly fought pitchers' duel between Stine of the Angels and Walker. Stine gave up nine hits and Walker seven.

Beavers Slaughtered

At Portland, San Francisco beat the cellar-dwelling Beavers, 16 to 8, in a game that saw a total of 35 hits. Four Portland pitchers pitched to the hill as the third-place Seals bunched four hits in the opening frame, five in the second, four in the eighth and one each in the third, fifth and seventh.

Harvey Storey, an Oregon youth who plays shortstop for the Seals, smacked two home runs. DiMaggio, Seals outfielder, got four hits in five trips to the platter.

Sam Gibson pitched the full route for San Francisco, giving up 12 hits.

San Diego traded places with Hollywood in fifth place, beating the Stars, 9 to 2, at the film city, Arizona. Hollywood twirler who was seeking his eleventh victory, gave way to Darrow in the sixth. The Padres picked Ardizola and Darrow for 18 hits, while their Al Olson gave up eight.

Bill Schmidt pitched a sixth-inning shutout at Oakland as the seventh place Sacramento Solons surprised fourth-place Oakland, 4-0.

FISHING SAID GOOD AT DIAMOND LAKE

NEW OPPONENT FOR BENNETT OBTAINED

Bobby LeRoy of Eureka to Be in Headline Bout on Roseburg Card.

Tallas Bennett of La Grande will fight Bobby LeRoy of Eureka, California, in the main event of the fight card scheduled here for June 25, the opening date of the state convention of the Eagles lodge, according to an announcement today by Pat Padelford, matchmaker.

Bennett originally had been matched against Walter Blackwell of Marshfield, but as Blackwell was several pounds below Bennett's weight, Padelford cancelled the date with Blackwell in order to provide a more suitable opponent for the La Grande fighter. Bennett will weigh from 145 to 148 pounds, while Blackwell would have been nearly 10 pounds lighter, Padelford said.

LeRoy is under the management of Tug Wilson, a well known California manager, who, in signing for the match, told Padelford he was very glad to get the bout for his fighter, who has been making a strong bid for coast honors.

Bennett is recognized as one of the best in his weight class in the Pacific northwest, while LeRoy has been knocking down the ears of opponents in California. The outcome of the coming fight at Roseburg doubtless will have a bearing on the coast lightweight title in the near future, as both boys are recognized contenders.

Manager Moves Here

A wider field in securing fighters for local matches is expected in the future as the result of the removal from Portland to Roseburg of Harry Eagles, manager, who has previously been managing several Portland and upper Willamette valley boys.

Eagles reports that he hopes to make arrangements to present Curley Hopper of Salem to Roseburg fans in the near future. Hopper, who weighs 125 pounds, has been creating a great sensation by his brilliant punching, and has stolen the show at each of his seven professional fights. He is an 18-year-old Indian boy.

While he is in Roseburg, he probably will not be matched for the card on June 25, it is planned to find a good opponent for him in the near future, Eagles said.

Wassom On Card

The second spot on the next card will be occupied by Carl Wassom and Ernest Moser, both of Roseburg. While Moser has not been seen in action locally, he is reported to have had considerable more experience than Wassom, who has made a sensational start with two knockouts in as many fights.

Wassom, after seeing Wassom work, issued a challenge and contends he can beat the new Roseburg flash.

Babe Fenton, the popular youth Sutherland lightweight, will tangle with Shug Bruner of Marshfield in a four-round match.

Paul Draehmer and Harvey Voller, both of Roseburg, and George Vincent and Marcus Wells, local boys, will hold down other preliminary assignments.

The card is to be presented at Flinly field as a part of the program for the opening day of the state convention.

HULL CRITICIZES AXIS' TRADE POLICY

WASHINGTON, June 13.—(AP)—The fifth anniversary of the United States' reciprocal trade program was marked today by an invitation from Secretary Hull to all nations to join in the treaties.

Hull criticized the closed economies of Italy and Germany in a statement last night, but invited them in effect to accept his trade program.

"If two larger nations enter into a discriminatory arrangement between themselves," Hull said, "with an agreement to divide their spheres of influence, other nations inevitably will take defensive economic measures and, instead of establishing peace and economic rehabilitation and progress, the result is bound to be a general collapse."

"Small nations which enter into such arrangements with a large nation become increasingly dependent upon the large nation for economic existence and inevitably become political vassals of the large nation."

Hull said the United States now has agreements with 20 countries covering nearly three-fifths of American foreign trade.
