V. F. W. AUXILIARY SPONSORS NATIONAL DEFENSE AWARDS

This year the United States Military Academy at West Point and the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis had added to their annual awards for scholastic and character excellence, two gifts from the Ladies Auxiliary to the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

While striving for permanent peace for America, the 10,000 patriots women constituting the auxiliary recognize that lasting peace can be assured only through adequate preparedness on land and on sea; through the encouragement of Americanism with a backbone.

With such thoughts in mind, and as an event in the program celebrating the twenty-fifth anniversary of their organization, the National Silver Jubilee executive committee of the auxiliary decided to present suitable annual awards to the cadet and midshipman, respectively, who should excel in the work of given departments or phases of student life for which heretofore no prizes had been awarded.

Approached on the subject of the gifts of her national organization to the two student branches of the auxiliary defense system, Mrs. Myrtle Norwood, president of the Patrick W. Kelly auxiliary to V. F. W. Post No. 2468, said, "Our Silver Jubilee Year has been so pronounced a success that our national organization decided to cap the climax with a gesture in the spirit of Americanism, which is so close to our hearts and lives, and which has been so definitely a part of our Silver Anniversary celebration.

Mrs. Norwood further revealed that Superintendent of the United States Naval Academy Rear Admiral Wilson Brown, when approached for his reactions, presented the thought that a prize offered under conditions which would give an opportunity to the greatest number of midshipmen would have the widest and most stimulating appeal, in these words: "There are a number of awards given students for excellence in various subjects or activities. These prizes are usually won by honor men or by men who have a special ability in the particular subject or activity. The great body of midshipmen have little possibility to win any of these prizes.

"It is therefore recommended that your prize be awarded to 'The midshipman making the greatest improvement in class standing for the course.' This would include the subjects of 'Aptitude and Conduct' as well as academic subjects. As such improvement in the class standing throughout the course can only come through constant effort, the prize would be an incentive to a very large number of midshipmen, and to a class of midshipmen not influenced by the other prizes."

The coveted prize, a fine pair of marine binoculars, engraved with the occasion and the name of the donor, was presented to Midshipman James Frederick Bennett Johnston, first class, of Oklahoma City, Okla., at a special dress parade at Annapolis on the afternoon of May 31. Mrs. Winnifred D. Townsend, past national president of the ladies auxiliary to the Veterans of Foreign Wars, made the presentation.

The response of Brigadier-General Jay L. Benedict, Superintendent at West Point, to the offer of an annual award by the auxiliary was equally enthusiastic and the competition equally as keen among cadets, as with the midshipmen. Since there had been no award for the cadet of the graduating class with the highest standing in civil and military history, Brigadier-General Benedict recommended that this prize be for scholastic excellence in that department.

The fortunate cadet, Woodrow William Wilson, will receive a beautifully bound set of books on military history, inscribed with the occasion and the name of the ladies auxiliary to the Veterans of Foreign Wars. The presentation will be made on June 10, by Mrs. Winnifred D. Townsend, past national president of the auxiliary.
