

SEATTLE CROWDING ANGELS FOR LEAD

Gap Narrowed to Game and Half by 2 Wins in Row; Beavers Beat Seals.

By the Associated Press. Seattle's stubborn Rainiers, who have been besting the Los Angeles Angels for first place in the Pacific Coast league since the baseball season started, and twice caught up with them—were only half a game behind the league leaders today.

"GIMMICK" GAG ON JOE LOUIS FIZZLES

By SID FEDER. SUMMIT, N. J., June 15.—(AP)—The hilarious "gimmick" gag was gone but not forgotten today and it was observers were convinced Manager Joe Jacobs' little stunt had added anywhere up to a couple of hundred thousand dollars to the rate for the Joe Louis-Tony Galento fight June 25.

Just for the records, the "gimmick" is a blunt metal instrument, known variously in the fight business as a "persuader" and a "slug." If and when used, it is camouflaged to resemble a portion of a boxing glove and is carried in the palm of the glove with just enough protruding to do fearful things when brought into contact with an opponent's anatomy.

Jack Blackburn Louis' trainer, laughed off Jacobs' whole statement. "Only gimmick that Louis boy needs," he chuckled, "is the five-fingered one he's got hanging on the end of his arm."
