OREGON DRENCHED BY OVERDUE RAINS

PORTLAND, June 16.—(AP)—The last trace of Oregon's spring drought—if any remained—had been erased by general rains to day.

Bend, Burns, Pendleton and Baker were the only dry areas in the state. North Bend wallowed in 1.26 inches of rain. Melama, in Marion county, was only slightly behind with 1.13 inches. Lakeview awoke to 1.8 of an inch of rain and a light blanket of snow. Ashland was drenched by 2.5 of an inch of rain and looked across to snow-covered mountains. Temperatures cooled down to 44 degrees early today, but a bumper crop was undamaged. Snow also melted in wet heavy flakes over the Klamath basin.

The mercury was below normal in all sections of the state, dropping to a minimum of 32 degrees at Siskiyou summit, the lowest, and ranging upward to 49 degrees at Portland.

Precipitation figures for the past 24 hours included: Brookings 7.6; Hood River, 9.1; Medford, 8.8; Roseburg, 3.1; and Portland 7.9.

The federal forecast was for generally fair weather tonight and Saturday with warmer temperatures in the interior Saturday.
