RECREATION NEWS

Douglas County Conditions Summarized in Forestry Service Bulletin.

There are thirteen improved forest camps in the Umpqua national forest, each with stone fireplaces, rustic tables, benches, trailer and tent sites. Some of them have swings, merry-go-rounds, and other attractions for the children. Several offer good swimming facilities, and many are centered in excellent locations for fishing, hiking and other forms of recreation. There is no charge at any of these camps, even the fuel being supplied free of charge. Detailed information as to location and attractions of the various camps will be given cheerfully by the forest supervisor at Roseburg or any district ranger.

Bohemia District
Fishing: Streams have fallen practically to summer levels. Fishing is reported as fair with both flies and salmon clusters bringing catches.

Roads: All roads are open. The Brice creek road to Fairview lookout on top of Fairview mountain is in fair shape, although somewhat rutted. This is a most interesting drive, climaxed by a superb view of many square miles of western Oregon mountain country. There is no charge at any of these camps, even the fuel being supplied free of charge.

South Umpqua District
Fishing: All streams are low and clear. A few good catches have been reported from Jackson creek and others of the smaller streams. The fishing at Buckeye and Fish lakes is still good.

Roads: All roads are open and in good condition at the time of issuance of this bulletin. However, even moderate rains will make the roads slippery at this season and heavy rainfall will make advisable the use of chains.

Diamond Lake District
Fishing: Authoritative reports from Diamond lake state that fishing there is the best it has been for several years. There are some times when the fish bite better than others, but most of the season to date the fishing has been consistently good. Stream fishing also is good this week. A number of excellent catches have been made on the North Umpqua river in the vicinity of Poole creek.

Roads: The road west from Big Camas to Snuff camp is temporarily closed. All other roads are open with the single exception of the Cascade lakes road which is closed by snow at a point two miles from Windigo pass.

Fishing: Reports from Steamboat and Idley on the North Umpqua state that trout fishing is

Unique, Attractive Resort Near Bandon Evolves From Exhibit and Miraculously Escapes Fire Sweep



Right on the coast, just a few steps from the beach—and four miles south of Bandon on the road that loops out along the beach from Bandon past the golf links and back into the coast highway—is located one of the most remarkable and interesting units of beach accommodations to be found on the entire west coast. It is called "Natureland Cottages."

The main building (it is one of fourteen) is pictured above. It is a show place in itself and, in fact, was erected in 1934 as a model house and thousands of people paid admission just to be shown through it during 1934 and 1935. Now it is the largest of a number of houses, each definitely different from the others, available for occupancy, fully furnished down to bed linen and dishes if desired, by tourists or vacationists.

Started as an Exhibit.
When John Dornath and his five sons, all of whom work together in constructing Natureland cottages and in the operation of a general contracting business around Bandon, built the first house it was not with the idea of serving vacationists. At that time they were operating a shingle mill and had invented and patented a shingle-like shingle. The model house was constructed to show the application of the new shingle for coast home building.

Later, however, the family moved out to the 100 beach lots they had acquired and what is now known as Natureland Cottages was begun. In addition to the accommodations mentioned above, the resort also has a genuine Dutch windmill that turns and pumps water, a beautiful garden, a camp ground and a fine beach just a few steps away.

Spared in Great Fire.
By some miracle that can never be explained, the buildings at Natureland were skipped over by the blaze when the great fire swept the entire coast line in the vicinity of Bandon. John Dornath points out, to those who ask about the fire, that the fire came toward their property, and the Dornath family were forced by the heat and smoke to go down to the beach and as far out toward the waves as they could.

Mr. Dornath, in telling of that experience, is even now wide-eyed about it, for he says, as the blast abated enough for them to leave the beach and survey what they thought would be the ashes of their several years of hard toil. The family found nothing was harmed on their land. They were simply overcome, Mr. Dornath relates, and sat right down on the ground and wept for joy—the whole family.
