 tions that Louis will halfkill him
 inside of two rounds, Tony enters
 his final bit of training still roar-
 ing drunk on self-esteem and
 mouthing his disdain of the cham-
 pion.
 "Some think it's pose, but I be-
 lieve the guy's on the level."
 Three hours at his training
 yesterday offered ample opportu-
 nity to study Galento at close range.
 He shows no sign of "nerves."
 He's still clowning before his ad-
 vancing New Jersey public, but behind

PLAYING STARTS ON ORGANIZED BASIS

Nearly 50 Boys and Girls Turn Out for Program at Finlay Field.

Nearly 50 boys and girls turned out Monday for the first day of organized playground activity under the direction of Jim Watts and four assistants at Finlay field, despite cold and threatening weather. With fair and warmer weather forecast, a future daily turnout of more than 200 is expected. Supervised playground activity is held each day from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. on the senior high school grounds.

Besides regular playground games, a full program of baseball, softball, tennis, track, speedball, volleyball, etc., fills the daily schedule, with midget baseball for boys 7 to 12 years of age opening the activity in the forenoon. A singles tennis tournament for boys and girls of all ages and adults is being organized. All those desiring to enter the tournament should sign up with Mr. Watts or his assistants at the grounds before June 24th, at which time the pairings for the tourney will be made.

More Ball Players Needed

More midget and intermediate class ball players are needed, according to Mr. Watts. Teams will be drawn and games played as soon as the organization of the groups can be completed. No teams have been picked and any boy turning out regularly will be given an equal chance to make one of the several teams.

The American Legion junior baseball team is working out daily from 2 to 4 and is rounding into shape. The instability of a number of the squad to turn out regularly has resulted in much sloppy field work in the last two games. Coach Watts hopes to remedy this defect before the regular season gets under way. The squad has shown plenty of hitting power and the mound staff is slowly rounding into shape. If the good work has been nullified by many inexcusable errors in the field.

Medford Game Sought

The American Legion's junior baseball committee is endeavoring to schedule a practice game with the Medford junior Legion squad, either here or there, for this coming week-end, with a return game being planned for July 2. Only those players turning out regularly for the team will be considered for the traveling squad. Any ball player who has not as yet turned out for the team is urged to do so at once as the deadline for completing the roster of the squad is tentatively set at June 30th.
