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Advice to Fathers

WHEN young boys are brought before juvenile courts on various delinquency charges, the judge usually gives them a stern lecture on their waywardness and points out where they will end up if they continue along the same path.

Recently 10 such youths stood before Judge Frank Biech in Chicago juvenile court. Some of them were repeaters and all must have expected the usual warning. Instead, Judge Biech called in their fathers.

"I find that one of the outstanding causes of juvenile crime is parental neglect," said Judge Biech, himself a father. "By that I mean a failure to recognize that children have problems as well as parents. These problems must be solved and it is our job as fathers to see to it that these immature minds have help and sympathetic understanding in solving them."

"The job of rearing children is not a part-time job. If done right, it is the most important business in the world. It pays the greatest dividends. Let me advise you. Get to know your boy. Live his everyday life with him. Love him and let him know it. Respect his ideas but try to guide him. That is the way, the only way to be a father."

The men shifted their feet, surprised and dismayed at the strange departure from court procedure. It had been many years since any had received a lecture. But every father in the hall knows that each of those 10 fathers went home that night vowing to follow Judge Biech's advice.

Embassy to Business

SINCE his appointment as secretary of commerce, Harry Hopkins has been putting forth considerable effort to win the confidence of business men. His degree of success has not been sensational, but nevertheless he deserves credit for trying in those times when cooperation between government and business would do plenty of good for each one of us.

Now Secretary Hopkins proposes to establish an "embassy to business" in his department. The senate has approved the plan and the house probably will follow suit. This would set up a "highly qualified staff to assist business and to appraise the larger problems that affect the commerce and industry of the country."

No administrative functions would this embassy have, but it would be free to contact industries to promote increased business activity. It would not be another government agency to police the activities of capital.

This agency, if finally authorized, probably would not attack our fundamental economic problems at their roots. But it could do just a little bit to bring some measure of harmony between the government and business, it would receive the sincere and well-deserved thanks of millions of average Americans.

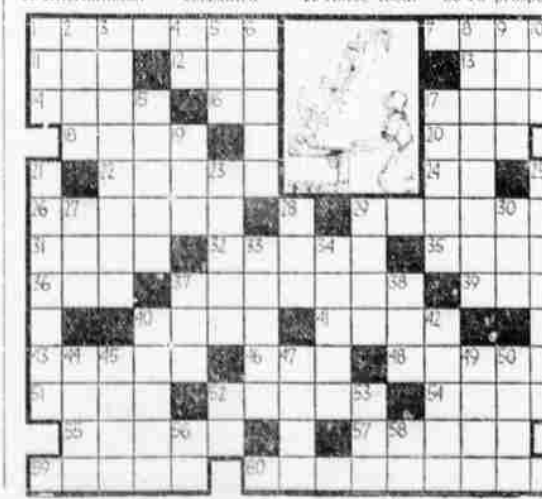

OREGON EVENTS FLASHED FROM WIRE SERVICE

PORTLAND, June 22.—(AP)—James Clark, Portland aviation instructor, and his student, Carl Hoffman, escaped unhurt when the motor of their plane stalled yesterday and they crashed in a drainage ditch near here.

PORTLAND, June 22.—(AP)—Adrian Houde, 38, millworker, celebrated the Fourth of July in advance last night by lighting a Roman candle made with powder and two feet of gas pipe. The explosion cost him his hand.

SALEM, Ore., June 22.—There are 129 life terms incarcerated in the Oregon state penitentiary, according to Joe Murray, chief clerk of the institution. One of the clerks is a 53-year-old man who has served 25 years for a murder in Columbia county.

The annual turnover of the prison population amounts to about half of the approximately 1100 inmates, Murray said.

About 200 men are employed in the prison's flax industry, he revealed. The 1200-acre farm where much of the food used in the institution is raised employs a number of others.

EUGENE, June 22.—(AP)—The Christensen Lumber company in Kings valley near Tallahassee, Fla., is accused of discharging men from the Douglas National Bank Building in Roseburg, Douglas County, Oregon, within 181 months from the date of this notice.
