

CINCINNATI LOSES TO BROOKLYN, 2-1

Victory Seventh Straight
for Wyatt; Giants and
Cardinals Win.

Camilli (and eight other Brook-
lyn bumpties) beat the Cincinnati
Reds last night, 2-1, and the decid-
ing blow was a home run by Camil-
li in the ninth inning. Further-
more he capped his customary fine
fielding game with a spectacular
one-handed stab of a liner in the
same inning.

The Dodgers' other run was also
a homer, by Stainback, and gave
Pitcher Wyatt his seventh victory
without defeat. The Dodgers got
only two other hits off Vanders-
meer, who struck out seven and
walked four. Wyatt yielded five
hits but didn't pass a batter.

All the other first division clubs
advanced against Cincinnati yes-
terday. Curt Davis, with some
steady pitching and his own big
hit, which accounted for a homer
and two other hits, led the St.
Louis Cardinals to a 1-2 victory
over the Phillies.

The New York Giants plinched
the Pirates, 6-4, with Hubbell do-
ing an excellent relief chore to
save the game for Melton, and
Whitehill of the Cubs shut out the
Boston Red Sox on seven hits al-
though his own team touched Pos-
edel for only five.

The world champion Yankees
cuffed Chicago's White Sox badly
in the middle innings for an 8-5
victory after the Pale Hose had
attained a 6-0 lead. The clincher
was a home run by Dickey with
one on in the seventh.

Kramer got himself and the St.
Louis Browns back into the win
column with a 6-0 shutout of the
Boston Red Sox although he had
to scatter 10 hits and four walks
to do it.

CLINIC PROMISES RELIEF TO GEHRIG

NEW YORK, June 22.—(AP)—
It's evident now Lou Gehrig made
the smartest decision of his life
when he voluntarily sent himself
to the Yankee line-up last
May 2 and broke his amazing en-
durance record.

If he had stayed in there stub-
bornly and fought it out with his
falling faculties, the great first
baseman might by this time have
been seriously injured or so far
had undermined his health that
recovery would have been hope-
less.

As it is, there seems reason to
believe the treatment prescribed
by Mayo clinic specialists will ar-
rest the infantile paralysis that
has afflicted Lou and enable him
to enjoy a moderately active life on
the chess he has accumulated from
baseball.

Lou's present duties as field cap-
tain of the Yankees practically
amount to a rest cure. All he
needs do is put on his uniform
daily and present the Yankee bat-
ting order to the umpire just be-
fore the game starts.

The salary, believed still to be
the largest of any player not also
a manager, will continue through
this season. What the Yankees will
figure out for him to do next year
is a question. It depends largely,
of course, upon the extent of his
recovery.

Outwardly, Lou shows no signs
of the disease. In fact, he looks
exceptionally healthy and his mor-

OAKS BLANK PADRES, REACH .500 MARK

Seattle Clings to Second
Place as Turpin Posts
10th Win of Season.

Oakland's fast-growing Acomas,
who have been doing some speedy
climbing from the Pacific Coast
league baseball cellar into fourth
place, can thank their Pitcher Ben
Cantwell for putting them at the
.500 mark in the standings for the
first time this season.

Cantwell shut out the fifth-place
San Diego Padres at Oakland last
night, 15 to 0, while his master fat-
tened their batting averages at the
expense of Gonzales and Tobin,
who gave up 17 hits between them.

Seattle meanwhile clung to sec-
ond place only a half game behind
Los Angeles by whipping the San
Francisco Seals at the northern city,
10 to 1. The Rainiers pushed over
six runs on five hits in the second
inning, in which Hunt slammed a
homer with two on.

Hal Turpin got perfect fielding
support as he marked up his tenth
victory of the season, while the
Rainiers eluded 12 hits off Kou-
pal and Powell, who took over the
mound in the wild second inning.

Hollywood stepped up a notch
into sixth place by rallying to beat
Sacramento, 6 to 5, at Hollywood.
Trailing 0 to 5 in the eighth, the
Stars tallied four runs on a homer
by Kable, and two more in the
ninth.

First-place Los Angeles had to
come from behind to defeat the
Portland Beavers, 4 to 2, at Port-
land. The Beavers, at the bottom
of the heap, scored one each in the
fourth and fifth innings. Los An-
geles turned on the steam for runs
in the sixth, seventh, eighth and
ninth off Laska.

Two player deals were disclosed.
Los Angeles announced it had
bought Al Epperly, right-handed
pitcher farmed out to Milwaukee
this spring by the Chicago Cubs,
and Hollywood bought First Base-
man Len Gabrielson from Balti-
more, where he has been sent by
the Philadelphia Athletics.

U. S. AUTOS COULD CARRY EVERYBODY

WASHINGTON, June 21.—(AP)—
More than enough automobiles
were operated in the United States
last year to carry the entire popu-
lation.

The bureau of public roads today
tallied 29,485,680 automobiles in
operation during 1938, with 1,955,422
trailers and 308,541 motorcycles
thrown in for good measure. The
population of the country is about
130,000,000.

Automobiles used 21,466,636 gal-
lons of gasoline, and operators
paid an average of four cents a gal-
lon tax on it, netting the states
\$771,764,000 in revenue. They paid
\$388,825,000 in registration and in-
spection fees, and reported \$2,724,-
000 in fines and penalties.

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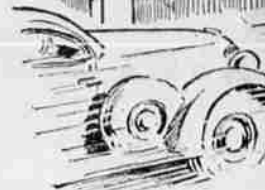
