RECREATION NEWS

Douglas County Conditions Summarized in Forestry Service Bulletin.

The fair weather of the past few days has brought about greatly increased usage of improved forest camps in the Umpqua forest. Fishing generally is good. Most streams are a little higher and slightly cloudy. Fire danger is not great, but as always care should be used to see that matches, tobacco and campfires are extinguished.

North Umpqua District
Fishing: A report from Steamboat states that trout fishing is excellent. Experienced fishermen have been taking large cutthroats, using a deep wet fly. Dry fly technique has also been successful. The early run of steelhead which came up during high water has congregated in Steamboat and Canton creeks, and there seems to be no fresh-run fish in the upper river at this time.

Roads: The North Umpqua and Little river roads are in good condition. The Red butte road is rutted and somewhat rough over its lower length—good higher up.

South Umpqua District
Fishing: Streams are reported to be a little lower with very slight cloudiness. Fishing is fair. From Buckeye and Fish lakes came the usual reports of good catches, practically everyone taking his limit.

Roads: All roads open and in good condition.

Diamond Lake District
Fishing: Diamond lake fishing is reported to be good. Most successful baits have been red-headed trout orens, No. 2 Andy Reekers, and No. 6 or 8 McGinty and brown hackle flies. Stream fishing is reported very good, with Bucktail, Coachman, McGinty and various hackle flies recommended as successful.

Roads: All roads are open with the exception of the Cascade lake road, which is closed by snow on Windigo pass.

Bohemian District
Fishing: Creeks are reported to be slightly higher and only moderately clear; fishing fair. Rutada forest camp near the Layne creek ranger station is still somewhat damp for ideal camping, and the swimming hole is not yet in use.

Roads: All roads are open.

EUGENE READY FOR DISPOSAL PLANT

EUGENE, June 24.—(AP)—All needed to insure actual start of construction of a sewage disposal plant for Eugene is the passage of the stream pollution bill now in congress. This announcement came yesterday from Mayor Elissa Lange.

Eugeneans have voted a bond issue of \$85,000 and the government has allotted PWA funds to the extent of 45 per cent of the cost of the construction of the plant. The estimated cost is \$150,000. The PWA share would be \$67,500.

Eugene water users are already paying the city's share of the cost of the disposal plant at the rate of several thousand dollars a year. Each water user pays 25 cents a month towards the fund.

Eugene sewage is now and has always been dumped into the Willamette river.

WISCONSIN KILLER STILL IN HIDING

HAYWARD, Wis., June 22.—(AP)—The six-day search for Ray Olson, slayer of two deputies, resolved mainly today into a game of waiting as foot-wearers possums hoped growing hunger would force the fugitive to reveal his whereabouts through a burglary to replenish provisions.

Armed guards remained posted at all resorts, stores and gasoline stations in the Moose Lake vicinity, where Olson was last seen Monday when he broke into a general store and stole food and tobacco.

Coroner Lester Anderson aroused a wild conjecture among a small army of possum hunters when he announced he had found a note written by Olson at the cabin of Indian John Blue Sky, where deputies Fred Scott, 46, and Cully Johnson, 27, were shot down Saturday when they attempted to arrest Olson on theft charges.

Anderson said the note had a "direct bearing" on the case, but declined to reveal its contents pending an inquest he expected to call in a few days.

HOCKLEY TELLS OF PWA ACTIVITIES

In its six years of operation, the Public Works Administration has undertaken a total of 1000 projects in Oregon, involving a total expenditure of \$124,000,000. C. C. Hockley, Oregon PWA administrator, told members of the Roseburg Rotary club and their guests at the regular weekly luncheon meeting of the club yesterday.

The speaker also presented his concept of what the course of future development of the Pacific northwest will be. He stated that sudden influxes of population could not actually be expected. The growth of our section of the country, he pointed out, would be in proportion to the development of new land and new opportunity. The existing arable land, he said, is now pretty well worked.

Dealing also with the nationwide unemployment situation, the speaker cited several causes for larger figures than recorded before the war and declared that one sustaining member in any one family was all that should be registered as unemployed.
