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WEEK-END TRAFFIC TAKES FOUR LIVES

Portland's Toll Increased for Year to 29; Rose Bowl Official Snaps Arm.

Traffic accidents cost four lives in Oregon over the week-end.

Edmund Bacewich, 18, died in a Portland hospital of injuries suffered in an accident which took the life of Teresa Groce, 19, Saturday morning. The victims were thrown to the pavement when an automobile driven by Robert W. McConnell, 24, crashed into a telephone pole as he attempted to turn in a street intersection. Bacewich's death was Portland's 29th traffic fatality this year.

A man tentatively identified from a social security card as Donald Martin, Rockford, Ill., was killed on the Corvallis-Newport highway by an automobile driven by Oscar Odense, 55, who was walking in the center of the road, Odense said. An inquest will be held.

Charles Mundlin, 12, died following a Crater lake junction crash near Klamath Falls. His father's automobile was forced from the road while attempting to pass a car driven by another son, Robert.

REDFORD, June 26.—(AP)—Hal Reynolds, Pasadena, Calif., chairman of the annual Rose Bowl football committee, suffered a broken arm Saturday when his automobile hit a curb and overturned in Mt. Lassen National park, near Mammoth Lake, Calif.

Mrs. Reynolds drove here for medical aid. Reynolds was en route to the Pacific coast football conference committee meeting at Timberline lodge on Mount Hood.

ALASKANS SHY AT COCKTAIL BAR BILL

JUNEAU, Alaska, June 26.—(AP)—This northern, with its legendary fame for hardy men who took their drinks straight and often—standing up—has failed to work up much enthusiasm for the modern plushiest drinking vogue.

The legislature passed a "cocktail bar" bill, effective July 1 at \$1,000 a throw for licenses.

But only seven applications have been made for licenses in southeastern Alaska, the territory's most populous area. Three were in Juneau, three in Ketchikan and one in Sitka.

It might be the haunting ghosts of Dan McGrew and his cronies, discouraging the turn to such "soft" joints, but observers also cite these angles:

Liquor consumption figures show that Alaska isn't living up to the heavy drinking tradition; the cocktail bar license fee is pretty steep for small towns; it's much more economical for residents to buy their liquor by the bottle, and feminine bar tenders are barred as a lure to business.
