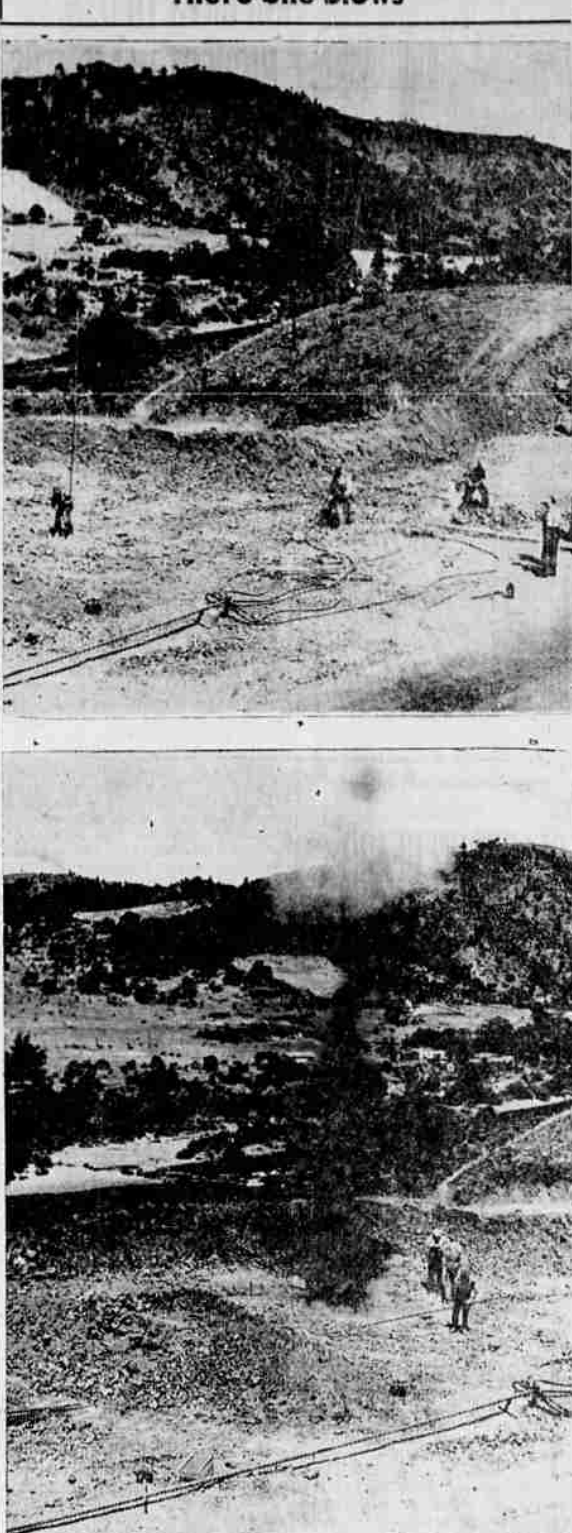
A NAME
