COOLER AIR CHECKS OREGON HEAT WAVE

By The Associated Press. Cooler air descending upon Oregon today checked temperatures after Wednesday's advance to the highest readings since the May heat wave.

Pendleton topped Baker and Medford by eight degrees for the warm, uncomfortable honor of recording the highest temperature yesterday. The official government report gave Pendleton 102 degrees, the hottest day of the season. Some local thermometers caught the heat at 99 degrees in town and 101 at the airport. Anyway, everyone agreed the sun was the most severe since the 81 degrees on August 25, 1938.

Bend reported 92 degrees, Brookings 83, Burns 82, Eugene 85, Hood River 84, Lakeview 90, Newport 82, North Bend 84, Portland 86, Roseburg 86, Siskiyou Summit 84 and Salem 89.

Clouds spread through western Oregon this morning, bringing the prospects of light rains tonight and Friday. The government weather bureau predicted declining temperatures in the northwest but warmer in the extreme southeast tonight. The interior generally, however, was expected to escape the heat tomorrow.

Neighbors soaked their shirts to fight a grass fire at A. H. Schuler's farm 14 miles northwest of Pendleton yesterday. The blaze destroyed a shed, wagon and farm equipment but was controlled before it reached wheat fields.

VICE CHARGES TO BE HURLED IN SEATTLE

SEATTLE, June 29.—(AP)—The Rev. J. Warren Hastings, pastor of the University Christian church and leader of a secret law enforcement committee here, said today evidence of "startling gambling and vice conditions in Seattle—a whole safe full"—would be placed before Governor Clarence D. Martin within a few days.

"The King county prosecutor's office and other local law enforcement agencies will be ignored," Dr. Hastings said. "We will go directly to the governor."

Dr. Hastings' announcement was an aftermath of Prosecutor B. Gray Warner's order, this week for a "closed town" and enforcement of the 1909 blue laws. In a sermon Sunday, Dr. Hastings announced formation of the committee.

Commenting on the 28-year-old prosecutor's campaign, Dr. Hastings said:

"It is going to be very interesting to see if he undertakes to go through with it. It will be fascinating to watch this move."

The prosecutor's ultimatum sent punch boards and dice games into the discard today. He said, however, he did not believe he would close theaters Sunday.

BROKEN NECK IN CAR UPSET FATAL

GRAND COULÉE, June 29.—(AP)—Elihu Seaton, 17-year-old Ellensburg motorist, whose neck was broken in an automobile accident near here yesterday, died at the Mason City hospital at 2 a. m.

Miss Seaton was paralyzed from the neck down when her automobile turned over on a curve as she and two friends, Warner Alder and Clifford Carmichael, were returning home from a sight-seeing trip to the damsite.

Neither of the two men were injured.
