

ANNUAL FIR POINT CONFERENCE OPENS

Presbyterian Young People
to Enjoy Camp Near
Glendale.

GLENDAL, June 29.—The Fir Point conference met for its annual session on Monday, June 26, to continue until July 2, with an enrollment of sixty-seven students and ten faculty members. This is a standard co-operating conference under the auspices of the Board of Christian Education and the Presbytery of southwest Oregon. The students are from various Presbyterian churches of the southwest Oregon area, the largest delegation being from Roseburg. Rev. Morris A. Roach of Roseburg is conference director, Rev. Lawrence Mitchellmore of Merrill is dean of men and Mrs. W. M. Campbell of Roseburg is dean of women. Rev. John W. Hoyt of Medford, chairman of committee of the Presbytery, is chairman in charge of arrangements for the conference, and Rev. J. K. Howard is treasurer and superintendent of grounds and equipment.

The conference day is divided into periods for teaching recreation and vesper services. There are two courses given in the morning followed by a recess period, and the morning assembly. Dinner is served at 12:40, after which a rest period is enjoyed. The afternoon is devoted to one teaching session, followed by swimming, baseball, tennis, handball and volleyball, supper being served at six. A vesper service is held at seven, and evening assembly at seven forty-five. After the assembly, the group gathers around the campfire for group singing, fun and games. On Saturday evening a communion service will be held.

The conference has an orchestra of about ten pieces and a fine choir.

The faculty personnel is as follows: Rev. A. Theodore Smith, of Klamath Falls, whose subject is "Our Presbyterian Church"; Rev. Hugh Bronson of Tule Lake, Calif., on "A Christian Faces Life's Problems"; Rev. Elmer E. Rosenkilde of Malin, "Choosing My Vocation"; Rev. Hugh Mitchellmore of Myrtle Point, "Youth and the Use of Alcohol"; Rev. Frederick Moore of Lakeview, "A Brief Outline of the New Testament"; Mrs. Albert H. Van Eiten of China, who represents the Board of Foreign Missions and who teaches on "The Outreach of Christian Missions"; Mrs. Reed Miller of Grants Pass, teaching leadership of worship period in Sunday school. Rev. Lawrence Mitchellmore is instructor in recreational leadership. Several special interest groups were organized for the first time this year, namely, photography, orchestra, leadership, game-making, consisting of construction of new games and puzzles, and leather work, under the instruction of Rev. Rosenkilde.

On Sunday, July 2, the group will hold Sunday school services on the conference grounds, and will attend the church session at the Olivet Presbyterian church in Glendale.

LIQUOR INITIATIVE HAS 15,000 NAMES

PORTLAND, June 29.—(AP)—Initiative petitions calling for repeal of the state liquor control act, general election in 1940 have received more than 15,000 signatures, Common Sense, Inc., said yesterday.

The organization favors a law permitting private sale of liquor and mixed drinks. The petitions must bear 25,500 signatures by July, 1940, to get the proposal on the ballot.

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UMPQUA S-L ASSN. CHOOSES OFFICERS

S. J. Shoemaker Elected
President; New Type
Loan Planned.

S. J. Shoemaker was elected president of the Umpqua Savings and Loan association at the annual meeting of stockholders last night. M. E. Ritter was chosen vice-president, H. O. Pargeter secretary-manager, V. J. Miceli treasurer, and Guy Cordon, attorney. Directors elected for three year terms were S. J. Shoemaker, Nathan Fullerton and B. R. Shoemaker. The holdover directors are W. F. Harris, G. V. Wimberly, H. O. Pargeter, Carl E. Ritter, Guy Cordon and M. E. Ritter. The appraisers named by the association are W. F. Harris, G. V. Wimberly and Guy Cordon, with M. E. Ritter as substitute appraiser. J. D. Wynn, Nathan Fullerton and A. J. Geddes were named as an auditing committee.

The annual report of the secretary showed a gain of \$25,854 in assets, the increase being from \$665,742 to \$691,597.

Mortgage loans, totaling \$147,791, show a gain for the year of \$15,481. Real estate contracts decreased \$5,841, with a present total of \$43,145, while real estate holdings gained \$11,142 to a total of \$32,589. Surplus profits and reserves totalling \$54,507, show a gain of \$3,785. Mortgage loans during the past 12 months amounted to \$81,137.

The association will distribute approximately \$25,000 in dividends and reserves of July 1, the directors having recently authorized a dividend payment of 4 1/2 per cent. The association in 22 years has never paid less than 4 1/2 per cent to stock holders.

Announcement was made at last night's meeting that the association will introduce a new type of 6 per cent direct reduction loan and will have \$100,000 available for new loans. The annual financial statement will be published for the information of interested persons shortly after the first of the month.

PUD CAMPAIGNERS MUST FILE ACCTS.

SPREAD OF PUBLIC HEALTH WORK TOLD

Public health work in the state of Oregon is assuming a greater place in the lives of the citizens of the state each year, according to Dr. A. Edward Rostrum, assistant state health officer, who was a visitor in Roseburg today.

Two years ago the state had only six health units, which now have been expanded to 15, operating in as many counties, he reports.

These county health units have had an important part in improving general sanitary conditions throughout all of Oregon, as well as preventing the spread of epidemic diseases through vaccinations and inoculations; have conducted clinics for preschool children and have assisted in correction of remedial defects, giving children a better opportunity for school advancement, and have greatly reduced the number of cases and deaths in connection with epidemic diseases.

Mr. Rostrum, who is in charge of the work of county health units for the state board of health, spent yesterday and a part of today in Roseburg conferring with Dr. A. N. Johnson, Douglas county health officer.
