

RECORD FARM BILL SENT TO ROOSEVELT

Approval Expected Despite
Outlay Far Exceeding
Budget Total.

WASHINGTON, June 29.—(AP)—Only President Roosevelt's signature was needed today to assure a record federal outlay of \$1,194,485,623 for federal farm expenditures in the 12 months beginning Saturday.

The agriculture department appropriation bill finally was enacted yesterday after five months of congressional pulling and hauling. Although it contained nearly \$250,000,000 more than Mr. Roosevelt asked in his budget, congressional leaders predicted he would approve it.

Senator Russell (D-Ga.), who guided the bulky measure through the senate, said he "could not conceive of a veto."

"I think this is the fairest appropriation bill for all forms of agriculture that the congress ever has enacted," Russell said. "Most of the criticisms about increases are due to misunderstandings not based on fact."

Although the farm bill was about \$247,000,000 larger than last year's measure, Russell said this was because of inclusion in a single bill of many items heretofore provided in separate measures.

The bill carried \$725,000,000 for payments to farmers who cooperate with the control programs for cotton, wheat, corn, tobacco and rice. This included an unbudgeted \$225,000,000 which the senate added for parity payments designed to make farm purchasing power to that of the 1909-1914 period.

Another senate addition to the bill was \$1,120,000 for surplus farm operations, in addition to the \$90,000,000 made available from customs receipts for this purpose. The funds will be used to supply surplus farm products to families on relief and to finance export subsidies.

PENALTY FUGITIVE OF 1934 NABBED

SALEM, June 29.—(AP)—Thurston Graham, who escaped five years ago after being fined \$250 and sentenced to serve 60 days in jail for drunken driving, found out today the law doesn't forget.

When he was sentenced at Woodburn, he asked the justice of the peace to let him go home to get the \$250. The judge had said that if Graham paid the fine, he wouldn't have to serve the sentence.

The constable who went with him reported Graham escaped. Graham, 45 years old, was arrested yesterday by state police at Woodburn. The officers said Graham had just returned from California.

Today Graham was in the county jail serving his sentence.

VERDICT CHARGES THEATER LOOTING

NEW YORK, June 29.—(AP)—Mrs. Lillian Schrein was convicted today by an all-male jury which heard her trial on charges of forgery and larceny in the theft of \$68,000 from the Martin Beck theatre corporation of which she was secretary-treasurer.

The jury deliberated three hours and 40 minutes. Judge Nott released Mrs. Schrein on \$5,000 bail pending sentence on July 7.

The comedy lumette is a niece-by-marriage of Martin Beck.

She is married and the mother of three children.

STRIKE OF DRIVERS HALTS HIGHWAY JOB

ALBANY, Ore., June 29.—(AP)—A strike of four drivers for higher wages tied up operations of huge mechanical dirt movers on an overhead highway crossing project here today.

The Albany chamber of commerce recently protested use of the machines, which it said displaced too many laborers. Honck Construction company officials asked Sheriff Shelton for assistance in settling the strike without violence, but the sheriff said he expected no trouble. The men, getting \$1.20 an hour, asked \$1.35.

JAP GIVES REASON FOR WAR ON CHINA

PORTLAND, June 29.—(AP)—Dr. Vivienne Inak of the San Francisco Japanese consulate told the Northwest Institute of International Relations today: Japan took up arms against China.

1—To drive out communism.

2—Because of resentment against control exercised over China by western powers with less investment there.

3—Because of inability to find a central government to deal with.

"Chiang-Kai-Shek does not speak for the majority of the Chinese people," Inak said.

Japan, he said, had 80 per cent of the foreign investment in China compared with 3 per cent by the United States.

ALL-MECHANICAL FARM UNIT SHOWN

DETROIT, June 29.—(AP)—The mechanized farming unit which Henry Ford asserts will "revolutionize agriculture" and "make the horse and other draft animals economically obsolete" was brought out for its first public demonstration today.

It was shown in the process of construction on an assembly line set up in the famous "H" plant at Ford's River Rouge factory, where submarine chasers were built during the World War, and in action on the acres adjoining the Ford home in suburban Dearborn.

Ford demonstrated the new farm implement to news and trade journal writers, and expressed his belief it "will give the farmer a new lease on life."

The motor manufacturer described the new tractor and its related implements, the invention of Harry G. Ferguson, an Irish engineer, as an economical, fool-proof and practically automatic unit of mechanized farm equipment that "will displace the horse on the farm just as the automobile displaced him on the road."

House never would agree to any curtailment of his monetary power.

Silver Price Pared
Secretary Morgenthau said in case the monetary bill was delayed he did not know whether the treasury would buy any domestic silver after tomorrow night until the bill finally was passed.

He announced that until congress decided future policy on foreign silver purchases—which the senate voted to stop—the treasury would continue to adjust its foreign silver price in the London market price in order to prevent foreigners from dumping the metal here in anticipation of a resumption of treasury buying.

Soon after Morgenthau spoke the treasury cut its price another half cent to 28 cents. Previously the London price had sagged half a cent below yesterday's level.

Danger Pointed Out
Morgenthau said he could not "imagine any more unfortunate time" for the president to lose his dollar devaluation power.

Asked what he meant, he referred reporters to newspaper stories of renewed tension between Germany and Poland and England and Japan.

Suppose someone starts competitive devaluation of currencies on July 1, what can we do? Morgenthau asked.

He said a lapse of devaluation power and the resultant difficulty of United States in offsetting another country's devaluation might endanger the tripartite agreement by which the United States, England and France contracted in 1937 to fight competitive devaluation.

Reminded the senate voted to extend the \$2,000,000,000 stabilization fund operated under this agreement Morgenthau said unless congress finishes the monetary bill in time, the \$2,000,000,000 automatically will revert to the general fund of the treasury and leave

nothing for stabilization operations.

It was learned house members of the conference committee on the monetary bill would be instructed to suggest to senate committee a domestic silver price compromise between 61.64 cents—the present level—and 77.57 cents the senate figure. An alternative to this, it was said, would be a tripartite to freeze the price perhaps for two years, at 61.64 cents.

Such an arrangement, informed persons said, probably would meet the approval of the silver senators because it would represent the best bargain that could be arranged before tomorrow night.

NAZI PLAN TO GET DANZIG IS FEARED

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"phrased." The press of Paris, also tense in anticipation of possible Nazi action, suggested a combined British-French-Polish warning to Germany that seizure of Danzig would mean war.

In connection with this question—whether it would mean war—the president of Poland, Moscicki, made a significant speech to the Polish people today. He implied that it might.

Today, with the Polish government the one to decide whether to resist in event of an attempt to seize Danzig, President Moscicki told his nation in a radio address that the Polish corridor and its southeast were "the air and sun of our existence as a state."

The German press rejected with ridicule Britain's denial that it was "encircling" the reich, and it indicated Hitler intended to follow his "road to destiny" without restrictions on his expanding navy. Britain had offered to negotiate a new naval limitations pact.

BRITAIN WIDENS ALLIANCE PROPOSAL TO RUSSIA

LONDON, June 29.—(AP)—Britain was said by informed quarters today to have sent proposals to Moscow for inclusion of the Baltic states and Belgium, Holland, and Switzerland in the proposed Anglo-French-Russian mutual assistance pact.

This proposal was said to have been in the latest instructions which the British government dispatched to the British ambassador to Russia.

The new instructions, these sources said, would come very close to Soviet Russia's original

demands and an agreement was expected next week or week after next at the latest. The negotiations have been in progress for two and a half months.

13 Nations Embraced

Countries which would be guaranteed by the projected revival of the World War partnership of Britain, France and Russia, under the reported British proposals, would include Poland, Rumania, Greece, Turkey, the Netherlands, Belgium, Switzerland, Finland, Estonia and Latvia.

With the first four Britain and France have concluded mutual aid agreements since Germany's absorption of most of Czechoslovakia last March.

The last three Baltic states adjacent to Russia—have insisted they did not want guarantees, but it was understood they would be named specifically in the three-power accord.

The new instructions were said to discard the provision for consultations before giving assistance to a country which has been attacked. Britain was described as

ready now to give automatic assistance in the event of any direct threat to Britain, France, Russia or any of the countries to be enumerated in the pact.

France was said to have approved the new British formula.
