

BRITAIN READY FOR WAR, HALIFAX SAYS

Navy, Air Force Declared Superior; Nazis Blamed for Their Isolation.

LONDON, June 29.—(AP)—Foreign Secretary Lord Halifax told the world tonight Great Britain had "an unchallengeable navy" and an air force "superior to all others" and was prepared to use them "to resist aggression."

In the most strongly worded speech he has made since he became foreign secretary, he repeated over and over again Britain was ready to meet force with force and said he hoped this was "understood elsewhere" as it was here.

At the same time he declared a "doctrine of force bars the way to settlement" of Germany's economic claims and gave a blunt answer to Nazi charges of "encirclement."

"Germany is isolating herself," Lord Halifax said, "and doing it most successfully and completely. She is isolating herself from countries economically by her policy of autarky (self-sufficiency), politically by a policy that causes constant anxiety to other nations and culturally by her policy of racialism."

He added: "If you deliberately isolate yourself from others by your own actions you can blame nobody but yourself and so long as this isolation continues the inevitable consequences of it are bound to become stronger and more marked."

Then, taking up Germany's claims for Lebensraum (living room), he said "this problem is not solved simply by acquiring more territory."

"It can only be solved," he explained, "by the wise ordering of affairs of a country at home and by adjusting and improving its relations with other countries abroad."

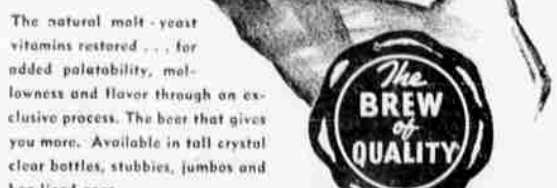

NEUTRALITY BILL NEARS HOUSE VOTE

WASHINGTON, June 29.—(AP)—The house argued its way closer to a vote on the administration's neutrality bill today amid sharp disputes over whether it would lead to war or contribute to peace.

The people demand a neutrality law, said Representative Isaac (Izzy) Cummings, speaking for the legislation which would repeal the present arms embargo. If they don't get it, he added, they will say to congress:

"You cowards, you threw up the sponge."

On the other hand, Representative Hill (D-Wash.) said of arguments for the bill:

"They're the same I heard in 1917 and I'm turning them down." Izzy said the present law was "foolish" because it did not stop shipment to warring countries of the things he declared they needed most—raw materials.

Representative Knutson (R-Minn.), who is Norwegian-born, asked the house to consider how Scandinavian countries had remained at peace and by way of emphasis called the attention of the house to Crown Prince Olaf and Crown Princess Martha of Norway who were seated in the diplomatic gallery.

The house and galleries stood and applauded the couple as they bowed and smiled.

Knutson said the measure gave undue advantages to England and France over other powers.

SALEM, June 29.—(AP)—An effort to persuade Gov. Charles A. Sprague to declare next Monday a legal holiday, so that Oregonians would have three-day holiday over the Fourth of July, was made today by County Judge David F. Graham of Malheur county.

Judge Graham asserting the governor of Idaho had designated Monday as a holiday in his state telegraphed that "I honestly believe people of our state would be delighted with like action. Please consider it."

The governor was out of the city when the telegram arrived, but earlier today he said "I won't declare Monday a holiday because there are too many holidays already."

California also will have a holiday Monday.
