

# BENNETT KAYOES LEROY IN ROUND 4

## Wasson Takes 2 Rounds to Beat Moser; Fenton Wins 4-Round Decision.

A large crowd of boxing fans attended the American Legion outdoor show last night at Finlay field and saw plenty of action in every round of the exciting card.

In the scheduled four-round main event, Dallas Bennett, 167, La Grande, claimant of the Oregon light heavyweight title, added to his impressive record a four-round knockout of Bobby Leroy, 160, Eureka, Calif.

Carl Wasson, 175, Roseburg, continued his unbroken string of knockouts by beating Ernie Moser, 179, Roseburg, in a four-round decision.

Babe Fenton, 136, Sutherlin, failed to produce a knockout for the first time since he started his appearances locally, but won a decision from Shug Brewster, 133, Myrtle Beach.

Paul Pralmer, 152, was given an unpopular draw decision in his match with Harvey Vallier, 137, Roseburg.

Marcus Wells, 152, Roseburg, outpointed George Vincent, 159, Roseburg.

Eddie Jackson, 125, Roseburg, was given a decision over Harry Fowler, 125, Roseburg, in a four-round curtain raiser.

**Bennett Wins Quickly**  
Leroy, although a willing fighter, was no match for the more powerful Bennett. Despite the fact they were scheduled for 10 rounds, both fighters started slug-ging at the opening bell. **Wasson Mauls Moser**  
Carl Wasson had some bad moments before he beat Ernie Moser in the second round of the scheduled six-round affair. Moser caught Wasson in the first on the mouth early in the fight, cutting his lips, but Wasson retaliated with a flurry which staggered Moser, who, however, managed to weather out the round. Wasson wasted no time in the second frame and drove in four rights and lefts which ripped Moser's face and had him bleeding and reeling as he began beating the ropes as his seconds tossed in the towel.

**Brewster Nearly Kayoed**  
Babe Fenton, the impressive Sutherlin youngster, found plenty of tough opposition in the person of young Brewster. Brewster had an advantage in reach together with an ability to absorb punches. He was floored by a looping right hand swing to the jaw at the close of the third round and went to his corner on rubber legs as the song sounded. He recovered sufficiently, however, to weather the fourth and last round, although kept strictly on the defensive. Fenton was awarded the decision.

**One Verdict Unpopular**  
The Vallier-Braehmer fight was a vicious encounter from the first bell. Braehmer carried the fight in the first two rounds, swinging a hard looping left which rocked Vallier on several occasions. Vallier countered with a right uppercut, which upset Braehmer in the first round. Braehmer went through the ropes in the third round, when he was caught off balance by a pushing blow on the chest as he backed away from his opponent. Evidencing an injury to his left shoulder, Braehmer lost his punching ability in the third round and finished the contest with his only good hand completely helpless. His right was ineffective for either offense or defense and he absorbed much punishment in the final round. Believing that Vallier had earned the decision, the crowd was vehement in its disapproval of the draw decision.

**Early Slugfest Good**  
Another good battle was the four-round preliminary between George Vincent and Marcus Wells, who slugged at one another for the full rounds. Wells had a decided edge in boxing ability, while Vincent was a hard but wild slugger. In the third round Wells began to solve Vincent's wild-swinging style and landed a number of good blows, but in the final round was too tired to follow up his improved tactics.

The two youngsters, Fowler and Jackson, who shared the card, gave a hit and run exhibition which proved interesting to the crowd.

## CABINET QUILTS IN NETHERLANDS ISSUE

AMSTERDAM, June 30.—(AP)—The Netherlands cabinet of Dr. Hendrikus Colijn resigned today as a result of a controversy with Catholic ministers over the question of borrowing funds to finance defense and unemployment projects.

Colijn, veteran political leader who passed his seventh birthday June 22, was awarded by Queen Wilhelmina immediately to try to form another cabinet. He withheld a decision temporarily.

Colijn, head of the comparatively small Catholic party who has steered the country through previous financial crises, has steadfastly refused to resort to borrowing and has insisted on keeping a balanced budget.

Recently he faced demands from the strong Catholic and socialist parties that the government embark on a program financed by loans to build four battleships for the Netherlands East Indies fleet and also a public works program to relieve unemployment.

**Army Begins Huge Expansion Drive**  
WASHINGTON, June 30.—(AP)—The army launches tomorrow its greatest expansion since the world war, with its retiring chief of staff recommending even greater increases than those already authorized.

A recruiting drive to enlist 412,500 soldiers in addition and replacements will start with the beginning of the government's new fiscal year, but General Malin Craig proposed in his final report an "economical property balance" defense plan involving a further increase of 25,000 men.

To attain a "position of readiness," Craig said the United States required:

1. An Alaska-Hawaii-Panama-Puerto Rico outpost line fortified and manned for instant action.
2. A regular army and national guard of about 2,000,000 men, expanded by five full divisions of seasoned regulars to be kept ready to reinforce quickly the outpost line.
3. Four special divisions are available now and Craig said to provide the five would require about 1,500 more officers and 25,000 men.
4. Civil arms and equipment to equip the army in an emergency to a million men.
