

MATRICIDE GRILLED ON DANGER'S DEATH

HOLLYWOOD, June 30.—(AP)—Police, claiming a confession of matricide from Campbell McDonald, 25-year-old student, grilled him at length today regarding the bludgeoning to death five months ago of a pretty young Russian dancer.

McDonald, arrested at Santa Monica last night, was quoted by Police Chief Charles Varco as admitting he beat his mother, Mrs. Margaret Campbell, 56, teacher and former silent screen actress to death with a hammer last Sunday night.

"She said she was going to have me placed in an institution," Varco said McDonald told him.

Officers reported McDonald denied knowledge of the fatal slugging of Anya Sosnyewa, former Ziegfeld follies dancer, on the Los Angeles City college campus last February.

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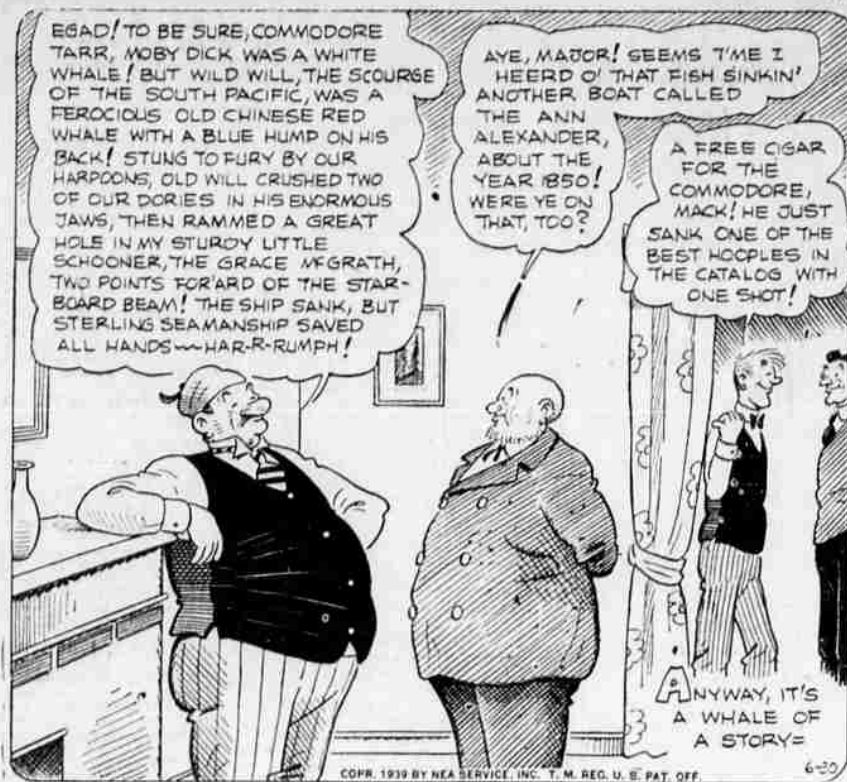
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DECISION FAVORS EMPLOYED WIVES

BOSTON, June 30.—(AP)—In an advisory opinion to the state legislature, the Massachusetts supreme court held today as unconstitutional the prohibition or restriction of employment of married women in public service.

The ruling gave force to working wives a major setback in a controversy which has raged throughout the state for the past two years. Opponents of working wives already have indicated they would seek a constitutional amendment in the event of an adverse ruling.

The court's majority opinion held "married women are not, by reason either of being women or of being married, excluded from citizenship, though before comparatively recent constitutional changes women did not have the political right of voting and of holding public office."

Women, married or unmarried, are members of the state. Subject only to constitutional limitations they share with other citizens the duties and privileges of citizenship. And like other citizens they are entitled to the benefits of the constitutional guarantee against arbitrary discrimination."

WASHINGTON, June 30.—(AP)—John Hamilton, chairman of the republican national committee, said last night the administration's proposed new lending program was "an unconscionable attempt to buy the 1940 election."

"Stripped of all its sugar-coating and plausible sophistry," Hamilton said, "it stands revealed as an unconscionable attempt to buy the 1940 election by sacrificing our American heritage of individual initiative and free enterprise, our historic system of free economy, for an alien state capitalism which, of course, is what is meant by national socialism."

"Remember it was the national socialism which brought Stalinism to Russia and Hitlerism to the Reich."

Ready to Fight
The foreign secretary did not specifically mention the Free City of Danzig—German before the World War and now affiliated with the Polish customs administration—but newspapers emphasized persistent reports of an impending crisis over Danzig this week-end, prompted Halifax' warning.

The Times of London, which often reflects official opinion, commented: "If the reich chooses to upset the present state of affairs (in Danzig) by force and if Poland's independence is thereby threatened, then this country will fight . . ."

Welcoming the address as "unshakably firm and irrefutably just" the Manchester Guardian added: "Germany must be left in no doubt that we are ready and determined to fulfill our obligations to Poland."

Europe is a puzzling jumble today of rumor, alarm and solemn warnings by high official spokesmen. The usual tangible bases for fear were not apparent, but grave British and French declarations that "further aggression" would be met by force matched rumors that Germany was preparing for a new coup against the Free City of Danzig.

Germans simply shrugged their shoulders, "we are conscious of our strength and supremely calm," they said. Berlin newspapers, in giving meager space to the Halifax warning, omitted his statement that Britain would "meet" force with force. They ridiculed reports of an imminent Nazi move.

Mussolini On Alert
Premier Mussolini was reported to be keeping in close touch with the fuhrer by telephone. The press and official quarters in

Rome too displayed outward calm, decriing "alarmist" campaigns abroad, but increased uneasiness was apparent among Italians themselves.

France looked to her defense as diplomatic quarters in Paris received reports that Germany had called up 600,000 reservists and that Italian military railway equipment was moving into Germany through the Brenner pass. Berlin said that "no abnormal number of reservists has been called up."

General Mamelin, head of all French defense forces, toured along the Italian frontier inspecting fortifications, and France opened up her enlistment rolls to foreigners in France wishing to fight during a war if war comes.

projects," said Representative Woodrum (D, Va.).

The compromise would place other federal arts projects—writers, artists and historical record surveys—on a local sponsorship basis. They now are financed wholly by the federal government.

The senate had proposed to continue the theater and arts programs on a curtailed basis, recommending allocation of three fourths of one per cent of all relief funds to them. This would amount to about \$12,000,000 in comparison with approximately \$39,000,000 provided for the closing fiscal year.

There was a compromise of \$22,000 as the limit WPA may expend on any non-federal construction project. The house originally had recommended a \$40,000 limit which the senate boosted to \$75,000.

Would Keep Harrington
John M. Carmody, head of the vast federal works agency which comes into being at midnight under President Roosevelt's government reorganization plan, disclosed today he wanted Col. F. C. Harrington, army engineer, to continue at the WPA helm.

Carmody made this known in his first public statement after being confirmed by the senate to administer the combined activities of more than half a dozen existing government units. The WPA appointment would give Harrington—an army officer with a reputation for slashing red tape and getting things done quickly—direct supervision over the spending of about \$1,500,000,000 in the next 12 months.

Uncertainties over the relief appropriation caused him to announce a shutdown of all WPA projects from July 1 to July 4. The 2,500,000 workers affected will be permitted to make up the time later in July.
