

FEDERAL DEFICIT UNDER ESTIMATE

WASHINGTON, June 30.—(AP)—The fiscal year which ends at midnight amid a flurry of overtime work by treasury bookkeepers has produced federal expenditures of approximately \$19,250,000,000, or \$2,500,000,000 more than the government's income.

The deficit, however, is nearly a half billion dollars less than expected, because of smaller expenditures and higher receipts than estimated six months ago. The national debt has just exceeded the \$10,000,000,000 mark.

Although the expenditures were the highest since the World War days, the deficit figure, which was the ninth consecutive annual shortage, was only the third highest. Exact figures for the year will not be available for a few days, but today's approximations were made by officials familiar with year-end items after study of figures through June 27.

CLAIMS GERMANS IN U. S. FACE PRESSURE

NEW YORK, July 1.—(AP)—William E. Dodd, Jr., son of the former United States ambassador to Germany, today called for a "thorough investigation by the state department" of what he described as pressure brought to bear on German-Americans by the fatherland.

Dodd, chairman of the American committee for anti-racial literature, declared the German embassy, legation, consulate general and consulate in this country were being used in an attempt to force naturalized Americans of German extraction to register for service in the armed and labor forces of the Reich.

FIRE RAZES SPRAY SHEDS OF ORCHARD

MEDFORD, Ore., July 1.—(AP)—Fire, believed to have been caused by defective wiring, totally destroyed the chemical spray sheds of the Bear Creek orchard early this morning. The loss is undetermined, but will not be high, Harry H. Holmes, one of the owners of the orchard, said. The property is located on the Pacific highway, two miles south of Medford.

The blaze was the second in less than a day affecting the pear industry of this section. Shortly before noon Friday, escaping ammonia from a tank in the engine room of the Medford Ice and Storage company caused a fire that crippled the plant temporarily and sent three firemen to the hospital when overcome by the acid fumes.

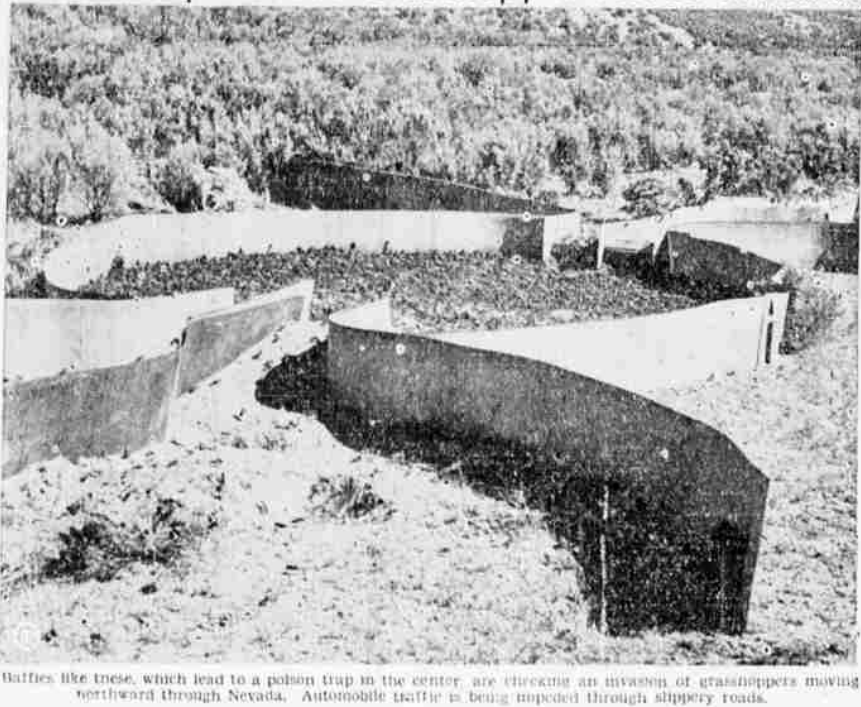

Va.) said in a statement today that "only a vigorous, unconditional and irreconcilable personal announcement by Franklin Roosevelt that he would decline a third term will prevent his nomination on the first ballot by the next national democratic national convention."

Neely added that, if nominated, the president would be re-elected by an "overwhelming majority" in 1940.

VALUE OF PRESS LIBERTY STRESSED

TIMBERLINE LODGE, Mt. Hood, July 1.—(AP)—Loss of a free press would also mean loss of the freedom of speech, religion and assembly, Donald J. Sterling, managing editor of the Oregon Journal and president of the American Society of Newspaper Editors, said last night in an address at the annual Oregon newspaper editors' conference.

"Newspapers are better today than they ever were," he said. "They have to be to survive. In thoroughness and variety they reflect the expanding facts and follies of society they serve whose attention is dissipated in many directions many times a day. Their purpose is to make people think and not to tell them what to think."

The editor said "whenever the private interest of the proprietor submerges his public interest, his influence is restricted and his profits, too."

He urged publishers to follow the rule of common decency and habits of fair play.

"A free press is the right of all the people and the chief institution of representative government," he continued. "All responsible newspaper men and women regard freedom of the press as a privilege to be cherished and not a license to be exploited."

"We must evaluate news to the best of our ability. We must resist propaganda from all sources. We must be tolerant and let us never lose our sense of humor."

Henry Fowler of the Bend Bulletin was elected president of the association today.
