

MRS. ROOSEVELT DRAWS YOUTH RAP

Criticism Follows Bolt in Organization in Effort to Swat Communism.

NEW YORK, July 5.—(AP)—The joint committee for the Defense of American Ideals, comprising leaders of 21 of the 22 organizations which led the American Youth Congress in a dispute over communism, accused Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt today of disloyalty to American youth.

In a telegram sent to the president's wife, the committee asked her to "join with us in a counter-offensive to safeguard American institutions" and said the congress "bravely and overwhelmingly placed its stamp of approval on atheistic communism, whose program is to overthrow American constitutional government and substitute therefore Moscow Stalinism."

Charges Trust Betrayed.
In a further report signed by the committee chairman, Patrick J. O'Shea, Mrs. Roosevelt was criticized for "her very acceptance of the innocuous and evasive statement of the principles of American youth congress creed." The report added "she has betrayed the trust placed in her by the youth of the nation."

Mrs. Roosevelt spoke before the congress Monday night after the 23 organizations had withdrawn. The crowd of which she expressed approval committed the congress to a defense of the constitution "only within the framework of the American system of government," and opposed "all forms of dictatorship."

Adoption of a compromise resolution denouncing "all forms of dictatorship" failed to close the split created in the American youth congress by the issue of communism.

Bolt Over "Red" Issue

Leaders of 21 member organizations bolted the convention Monday when it refused by a voice vote to adopt a resolution specifically condemning communism "because it is opposed to the principles of a belief in God, the inviolability of private ownership of property and internal peace."

In other resolutions the congress favored a government marriage bounty; creation of a federal loan fund up to \$500,000,000 to help youths from 16 to 20 get started in life; approval of the principle of married women working; extended support to organized labor and organized youth in "securing their guaranteed rights to organize and bargain collectively," and endorsed a program of government credits to Latin America for internal reconstruction and "mutual defense."

TARIFF UPPED TO MEET ITALIAN ACT

WASHINGTON, July 5.—(AP)—The treasury imposed extra duties today on Italian silk.

The special duties applied to all goods from Italy made in whole or in part of silk.

They were required by law, treasury officials said, after an investigation showed that Italy was subsidizing the export of silk goods.

The tariff act of 1930 requires the treasury to offset export subsidies of other countries by adding to the regular tariff and extra- or countervailing-duty equal to the amount of the subsidy the extra duty on Italian silk varied according to different silk items.

Officials said the action had no political significance, but it was the first new countervailing duty since the treasury put into effect in April a special 25 per cent duty on all merchandise from Germany.

ALCATRAZ ESCAPEES SAID STILL ALIVE

GARDEN CITY, Kas., July 5.—

(AP)—Police investigated today the possibility Ralph Roe, 29, and Theodore Cole, 23, who disappeared from Alcatraz penitentiary Dec. 15, 1937, are alive.

Earl McGuire, arrested near Syracuse, following the fatal shooting of Deputy Sheriff Ray Kumpf, told officers here he had played poker with Roe and Cole last Friday night at Pueblo, Colo.

Kumpf was shot Monday as he attempted to take two men from a freight train at Syracuse. Bruce Slack, Hamilton county attorney, said first degree murder charges would be filed against McGuire. Meanwhile search for the other man on the train continued.

Roe and Cole are the only two men ever to disappear from rocky Alcatraz since it became a federal prison in 1934.
