

## NAZIS CLAIM F. R. BOOSTS WAR PERIL

BERLIN, July 5.—(AP)—A semi-official Nazi commentary, addressing itself to the people of the United States, said tonight "the intention of Roosevelt to line up America in the encirclement front does not less the danger of a world war but on the contrary increases it."

Deutsche Dienst, distributed by the official German news agency, gave this reaction to President Roosevelt's comment yesterday concerning the position of the United States house of representatives in writing in a modified arms embargo into the American neutrality law.

(Mr. Roosevelt said the first policy of his administration was to prevent any war in any part of the world because anything that can be done to stop war is good. He asserted press dispatches from four fascist and Nazi nations were substantiated by reports to the state department.)

Deutsche Dienst said that to maintain Germany welcomed the action was a "biased falsification." The service added that in making his statements at his Fourth of July press conference the president "perhaps was under pressure of the many exploding firecrackers."

Mr. Roosevelt was painting "war ghosts on the wall," the service said, and "cast suspicion above all on congressmen as disguised Nazis and culprits for the next world war."

## MRS. F. R.'S STAND HIT BY VETS' HEAD

BOSTON, July 5.—(AP)—The Boston Post said today Stephen F. Chadwick, national commander of the American Legion, had expressed himself in an interview as "disappointingly disturbed" over Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt's praise of the American youth congress which he criticized for its "pink complexion."

Chadwick was quoted as saying he had "observed the statement of Mrs. Roosevelt" in praise of objectives of the youth congress in which she said "nothing finer has come out of any organization."

Commenting the congress subsequently had failed "to condemn communism and other isms which would destroy us as a free people," Chadwick was quoted further as saying "I am most disappointingly disturbed by Mrs. Roosevelt's endorsement of their position."

Subsequent to Mrs. Roosevelt's comment, the youth congress first refused to adopt a resolution specifically condemning communism and later unanimously adopted a compromise measure assailing "all forms of dictatorship, regardless of whether they be communist, fascist, Nazi or any other type."

## JULY 4 TRAGEDIES EXTEND TO BRITAIN

HALIFAX, England, July 5.—(AP)—The explosion of a cannon used in a house party's midnight celebration of July Fourth at Queensbury, near Halifax, last night killed a woman and injured two men.

Guests at the home of Major Laurence Foster had adjourned to the grounds to fire the old cannon. But it exploded as they waited and Mrs. Mansel Thomas, 25, of Lightcliffe, Yorkshire, was killed.

The injured were Lieut. Col. H. L. Grylls, commander of the 53rd anti-tank regiment at Halifax, and G. Barrett of Ryburndale, Ripponden, Halifax. Their condition was not serious.

Mrs. Foster last year married an American girl and several Americans were guests at the house party celebrating Independence day.

Mrs. Foster is the former America Poome of Denver, Colo. Her parents, who are residing in England, were among the guests.

The cannon was fired three times successfully. Then on the fourth attempt it blew up, killing Mrs. Thomas.

## EX-O. S. C. GRIDDER STILL LIVELY COP

PORTLAND, July 5.—(AP)—Detective Dan J. Mitola, one of the Oregon State Police "iron men" who broke Southern California's string of grid victories several

years ago, can still hold his own in a scuffle. When he saw two men breaking into a market, he tied one to a post and pursued the other into the store. The intruder slashed his way through a canvas-covered doorway and ran. Mitola fired twice and sprinted two blocks before overtaking the fugitive.

## FIFTY HURT WHEN BLEACHERS CRASH

WAUKEGAN, Ill., July 5.—(AP)—More than 50 persons suffered bruises or other injuries when wooden bleachers collapsed at the climax of an Independence day pageant and fireworks show.

Approximately a thousand spectators fell to the ground in a tangled mass when the structure gave way last night.

The bleachers collapsed without warning when spectators rose to sing the national anthem during a pyrotechnic display of the American flag.

Grasping and shouting in the darkness, the crowd fought to extricate itself. Many were trampled in the rush for the open field. Quick action by police, firemen and national guardsmen was credited with averting a panic among the 20,000 spectators at the scene.

Firemen threw searchlight beams on the scene of the accident while a Red Cross unit stationed at the field gave first aid treatment and sent others to hospitals. Four of the 15 taken to hospitals were treated for broken bones.

Mayor Mancel Talcott said the stand had been used for football games and there was no indication it was unsafe.
