Moreland of Portland is the full-time service officer, employed by the commission. Mrs. Edith Scott of Portland is in charge of hospital services at Roseburg Veterans hospital and Mrs. Irvin B. Riesel of Roseburg has similar duty at Roseburg veterans hospital. Moser is secretary of the rehabilitation commission. The commission, a new organization, in its first year of operation, has complete charge of the hospital and service work of the two organizations.

vice-president, from serving in the same office again.

The committee also divided, 7 to 7, on a proposal for a single 6-year term for future presidents and vice-presidents. Senator Burke (D., Neb.), its sponsor, said it would not be President Roosevelt from a third term.

After the tie-vote on the "single term" proposal, the committee voted to report both proposed constitutional amendments to the senate with a record of the committee votes on each.

A tie vote on a proposal defeated it.

Ickes At Issue
On the home side, the rules committee held a lively session on whether to give the Hatch bill, designed to ban politics in relief, right of way on the floor. Rep. Dempsey (D., N. M.) asserted the bill had been "stalled long enough."

Rep. Smith (D., Va.) wanted to know whether it would "prevent Secretary Ickes sticking his nose in a state primary?"
"No, sir," said Acting Chairman Celler (D., N. Y.) of the house judiciary committee.

"Then I've lost my interest," Smith said.

War Referendum Hit
Two war referendum proposals sponsored by 12 senators were rejected today by the senate judiciary committee but sent on to the senate for consideration.

The committee, by a 9-to-5 vote, disapproved a proposed constitutional amendment which would have ordered a popular vote to decide on a declaration of war on participation in "warfare overseas."

By a second vote, 9 to 6, it disapproved another proposal which would have called for a referendum and then final action by congress in declaring war.

Both proposals would have vested war-declaring powers in the electorate, except in the case of an actual or threatened attack upon the United States and its possessions, or any western hemisphere country.

Other Congress Activity

Before the monopoly committee, Morton Zedlitz of Chicago, United States building and loan official, argued new government agencies were not needed to encourage home financing. He proposed the government get behind existing institutions in that field.

The senate labor committee heard from Byrd A. Whitney of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen that "destructive" amendments to the Wagner labor act might bring on an increase in industrial strife.

House leaders decided to postpone until next week consideration of a bill authorizing a library at Hyde Park, N. Y., for President Roosevelt's papers and books. It was scheduled to come up tomorrow, but leaders said too many democratic members were out of town. The proposal has strong republican opposition.

TREASURY PARES PRICE OF SILVER

WASHINGTON, July 6.—(AP)—The treasury slashed its foreign silver price today from 38 to 36 cents per ounce.

Foreign silver buying was resumed at this lower level for the first time since last Friday.

The treasury price compared with today's spot silver price of 36.73 on the London market.

WARDEN STRESSES "PROBLEM CHILD"

SAN FRANCISCO, July 6.—(AP)—The warden of America's so-called "Devil's Island" warned the nation's teachers today to recognize that "the unsolved problem child is the genesis of crime."

James A. Johnston of Alcatraz prison in San Francisco has told the National Education association "the very large percentage of (penal) institution inmates" who "dropped out of school during the elementary period... are school failures and failures of the schools."

He said his long experience in western prisons had taught him "if we would spend more time and effort and money in making of our citizens, we would not be obliged to spend so much in attempts at their retraining."

The warden formerly was chief of California's Folsom and San Quentin prisons.

the new scale a distinct threat to the prevailing wage system, under which the government heretofore had matched the wages paid by private employers.

Under the new schedule common laborers will receive \$55.20 a month, semi-skilled workers about \$66, skilled workers \$85.20, and professional men, including lawyers and physicians, \$90.

A reduction of 200,000 in last month's WPA payroll of 2,500,000 also has been ordered for July, a factor that has brought threats of additional demonstrations.

Lieut. Col. Brehon Somerville, WPA administrator in New York City, ridiculed union statements that "practically all" of the 32,283 skilled workers on WPA construction projects there had quit work. He said only 3,000 or 4,000 were directly involved and requisitioned replacements from the home relief bureau.

OFF JOB FIVE DAYS MEANS DISMISSAL, CHIEF SAYS

WASHINGTON, July 6.—(AP)—Colonel F. C. Harrington, works projects commissioner, instructed state administrators today to warn any WPA workers walking out on their jobs they would be dismissed if they stayed away five days.

He sent this telegram to the state officials:

"In cases where groups of workers stop work in protest against requirements that they work 120 hours per month to earn security wage, it should be explained to them or their representatives that this is a requirement imposed by law and that no official of the works project administration has any authority to depart from it. Preliminary notice to this effect was required to be given to all workers in accordance with my telegram of June 19 and July 1.

"Workers should be informed that decision rests entirely up to them as to whether the desire to accept employment under the conditions under which the work project administration can offer such employment."

Those who do not desire to accept employment under these conditions and who absent themselves from work for five consecutive working days or longer shall have their employment terminated."

**STRIKE IN LEWIS COUNTY
AFFECTS BONNEVILLE LINK**
SEATTLE, July 6.—(AP)—State Administrator Don Abel was notified today 500 WPA workers were on strike in Lewis county in protest against increased working hours ordered by the national headquarters.

The number includes nearly all the WPA working force in that county, he said, and projects closed include the clearing of right-of-way for Bonneville dam transmission lines. The working hours had been increased from 84 to 120 hours a month, with no change in wages.

Abel said WPA rules provide if workers are off three days they are automatically dropped from the rolls.

Other certified WPA workers are then assigned to the projects. There are approximately 14,000 such other certified workers in the state, including those in Lewis county, he said.

artillery and about 100 tanks in the Nonom-Kan-Bud-Oho area south-east of Lake Bor.

Say Border "Violated."
"Supported by bombing and fighting airplanes," the communique continued, "the Japanese-Manchurian forces again violated the border of the Mongolian people's republic and at dawn of July 3 launched an offensive... attacking position of Mongolian-Soviet troops east of the Khalka river and attempting to break through west of the river."

The communique said one Japanese infantry division and an infantry regiment, two tank regiments and six cavalry regiments participated in the offensive, and continued:

"Mongolian-Soviet troops repulsed all attacks of Japanese-Manchurian troops, and inflicted heavy losses. Northwest of that area, Japanese infantry supported by no fewer than 60 tanks forced back Mongolian-Soviet cavalry units, crossed to the west bank of the Khalka river, and occupied a small area."

"As a result of a determined

counter-attack by Soviet-Mongolian troops, Japanese troops which crossed to the west bank of the Khalka were repulsed, suffering great losses east of the Khalka by the end of July 5.

"In the course of these days, Soviet-Mongolian artillery destroyed 50 Japanese tanks and disabled eight artillery guns."

"About 800 Japanese-Manchurian troops were killed, Mongolian-Soviet troops lost 100 men killed, 200 wounded, 25 tanks and armored cars were disabled."

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At Jackson, county seat of Breathitt, college buildings of the Mountain Bible (Methodist) institute were carried away including a dormitory housing 25 boys and girls in Breathitt county. Nine students are missing. Three teachers battled the waters for two and a half miles before being rescued.

Injuries, the Red Cross reported, were negligible among the more than 100 homeless in Morehead.

ONE OF 2 COLLEGES ESCAPES
This town's population is 2,500 but it is swelled during the winter months by students at State Teachers' college. Morehead, like other hill country localities, is built mostly in the low-land-level ground between mountains—but the school was erected on high ground, so it escaped damage.

The college, however, is serving as a refuge for persons made homeless by the flood. Refugees were also being housed in private homes, opened to them in true mountain hospitality.

Victims Caught Asleep
Mountaineers, their wives, children and children's children went to bed Tuesday night—as they have done for generations—unmindful of the impending treachery of streams that ran past their door, merely trickling at times.

About midnight the rain came in torrents. A few hours later walls of water estimated by some to reach 20 feet in height moved down upon the sleeping communities. Floods have come often to harass these people because they have had to perch their homes on small level spots between the tall hills above them. But this one was the worst, many said, in this area.

There was not the slightest warning of the flood, survivors said. When it came it sounded like thunder—howling over homes, sweeping humans, cattle, hogs and automobiles alike. People trapped in their homes didn't have a chance of escaping the onrush of the red-dish-yellow fluid.

Armed deputies and state police cast a watchful eye on the area because Mayor Edward Kelly of Flemingburg, 25 miles to the north, after a trip to Morehead said "some looting already had begun."

OTT'S

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RAIDED BY JAP BOMBERS**
HONGKONG, July 6.—(AP)—Fenghua, birthplace of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek, and Kian, where Chiang Chin-Ko, the generalissimo's son, commands a Chinese army unit, were among half a dozen South China cities heavily bombed yesterday by the Japanese air force.

Reports received today said casualties were light but material damage heavy. Japanese air raiders also bombed Shaoching, Chekiang province, China's most famous wine-producing center.

Fenghua is in eastern Chekiang, south of Shanghai; Kian in southern Kiangsi province.

Captain J. T. O. Stapler, commander of the United States navy's south China patrol, reported three Americans and five other foreigners had been taken out of besieged Foochow by the United States gunboat Asheville and the British destroyer Duchen, at the mouth of the Min river.

Foochow, on the Min river in Fukien province, has been under Japanese siege by land and water since June 28.

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
