

LEGION JUNIORS DATE ZONE SERIES

Roseburg - Medford Clash to Determine Baseball Semi-Finalist.

The Roseburg and Medford Legion Junior Baseball teams will clash on Friday night Sunday afternoon for their third time. After playing two King's X games, the Roseburg and Medford teams settle down Sunday in a district championship, three-game play-off series, from which the winner will advance into the semi-finals with the winner in the southern Willamette valley district.

The Roseburg and Medford teams are the only groups organized in American Legion district No. 4, which embraces the southern Oregon counties. The district No. 4 winner will meet the champions of district No. 3, embracing Lane, Linn, Benton and Lincoln counties, and the inter-district winner will go to the annual state championship series played at Woodburn.

In practice games Roseburg holds a 2-0 advantage over Medford, but the close scores in the two previously played games, 9 to 7 and 7 to 6, indicate that the three-game series for the title will be closely contested affairs.

Fans' Support Urged
The first of the three-game meetings will be held in Roseburg Sunday, starting at 2:30 p. m. Irving Riegel, chairman of the baseball committee of the local post, urges all baseball fans to attend. Not only does the team need the support of fans in their forthcoming game, but the committee needs the money, Riegel states frankly.

As games are played on a home and home basis, each team keeping its own gate receipts and paying its own expenses away from home, a pool gate will be necessary next Sunday to enable the team to go to Medford the following week to play the second and possibly the third game of the series. A double header will be played at Medford on the 10th unless one of the teams wins both the first and second games.

Good Games Assured
While urging fans to attend Sunday's game to encourage the team and to help with the expenses of the season, Riegel promises that all present will receive their money's worth in good baseball. The two previous games played by Medford and Roseburg have been full of thrills, particularly their meeting here July 1, when Medford went ahead in the ninth inning only to be crowded out of a win by a spectacular last minute rally by the Roseburg players.

The local boys are working hard daily, under the tutelage of Coach Jim Watts of the senior high school, and regardless of whether they win the series they will at least be trying all the time, Riegel predicts.

TWO-HIT PITCHING DEFEATS CLEVELAND

White Sox Ascend to 4th Place Tie; Yank Hurler Wins 10th Straight.

Edgar Smith, left-hander of the White Sox, yesterday came up with a two-hit pitching jewel which parried the Cleveland Indians, 2-1, and lifted the winners into a tie for fourth place in the American league.

The defeat dropped the Indians into tie for fourth and raised the idle Detroit Tigers into third in the American league.

The New York Yankees beat the Washington Senators, 6-4, to give Donald his tenth straight victory of the season, which just about establishes him as the rookie pitcher of the year. However, Donald gave up seven walks and a couple of homers in an unspectacular seven-hit performance which was won for him by the heavy hitting of his mates, DiMaggio and Gordon hit homers.

The Boston Red Sox stopped the Philadelphia Athletics by the same score, 6-4, with a 14-hit attack. The Cincinnati Reds had no trouble turning back the St. Louis Cardinals, 6-2, on Walters' four-hit pitching. The National league leader gave Walters an early lead which he protected to good effect except for a homer by Gutierrez. It was Walters' 12th victory.

Hubbell pitched three hitless innings in relief to take the sting out of the Boston Blues in a slugging session which the Giants finally won, 11-7, with a four-run rally in the ninth. It was Hubbell's second win of the year and his first in seven weeks.

The Brooklyn Dodgers ponced on the Phillies for their third in a row, 7-1, to move into fourth place as the Pittsburgh Pirates choked off the Chicago Cubs, 10-1.
