BONNEVILLE POWER
ABSORPTION SEEN

PORTLAND, Ore., July 6.—(AP)—Frank A. Banks, acting Bonneville dam administrator, predicted today contracts negotiated within the next six months would absorb the bulk of the Columbia river project's electrical power capacity.

The administrator, returning from Washington conferences with Interior Secretary Ickes, the federal power commission and the national power policy board, said the agreements would be with private utilities, public utility districts and municipalities.

The program submitted to federal authorities will bring the first revenue for the \$62,000,000 already spent for the huge navigation and power enterprise.

Banks, chief engineer at Grand Coulee dam, advised Ickes and other officials the northwest power market was growing rapidly and would take the output of the first four units before the army engineers had completed the fifth and sixth. Provisions will be made to reserve 50 per cent of the capacity for public power agencies.

The progress report said the transmission lines to Vancouver and from Vancouver to Eugene would be finished by November. The first line to Grand Coulee and to Raymond, Wash., via Kelso will be completed in a year.

U. P. CHIEF WOULD
ALTER LOAN PLAN

OMAHA, Neb., July 7.—(AP)—William M. Jeffers, president of the Union Pacific railroad, in an interview suggested President Roosevelt's new spending-lending program would be more helpful to railroads if altered to provide the government lend money to railroads for new equipment rather than build and lease rolling stock.

The government would retain title to the rolling stock as collateral for the loans, he added. Jeffers bluntly commented the Union Pacific is "not interested" in the proposal as first outlined by President Roosevelt. He spoke then of difficulties that would be encountered if a mass production system were utilized to build equipment.

"Fundamentally, it is one thing to talk about government building and another thing to do it. For instance, there are no run of mine box cars while there is

some standard building, the railroad business is mainly specialized."

He explained the Union Pacific needs one type of car for lumber shippers of the northwest, another for the automobile manufacturer and other types of cars for other shippers. Yearly changes in automobile designs mean changes in box cars, Jeffers said.

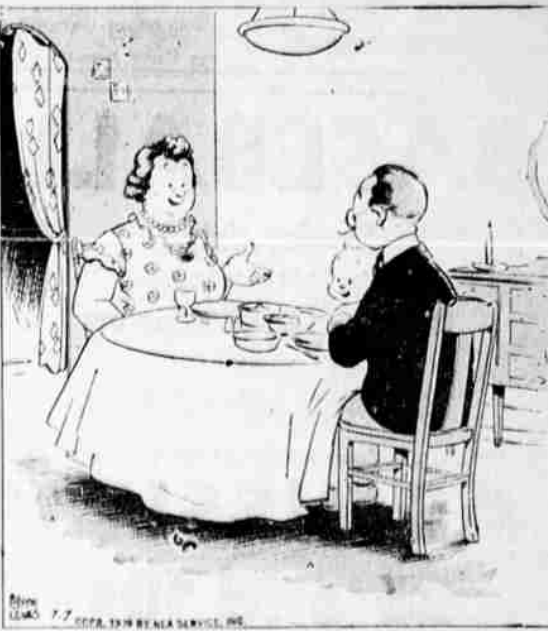
