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The most important news of the day is the threatened strike of WPA workers. The greatest importance of this news, in the opinion of this editor, is the public reaction to the situation.

The credit of the government is about to be strained to the breaking point to give subsistence to those who are not able to find regular employment. It is not a condition that anyone enjoys.

If the proposed strike meets with little or no public indignation, it is a red light—there is danger ahead.

This is said, of course, without reference to the point that organized labor feels involved—namely the keeping of wage scales for certain classes of labor at a proper level. The cold brutal fact is that whatever the work that is provided by unemployment relief funds, it is work that is being done to keep people from starving and is not being done for any other reason.

Employed labor is being directly or indirectly taxed to help meet the cost of employing relief labor. The property of laboring men is subject to the great federal debt that is being rapidly increased under the spend-learn program.

There is something wrong, therefore, with the reasoning behind this proposed strike—the reasoning of the labor officials, that is. The strike is a recognized weapon used for the purpose of bringing employers to time—used to enforce union demands.

Who is the employer of WPA workers? Surely the labor leaders have not forgotten that this is a free and self-governing country and that the rest of us are actually the nominal employers of the WPA workers.

Employment of unemployed persons on spending program projects was adopted as being a better policy of providing subsistence than a straight dole. It is not a program of employment designed to meet and conform to all conditions of regular employment. It is simply the best a government can do toward providing work to do and subsistence for those who have been unable to get regular jobs.

To attempt to make WPA employment attractive, and to all intents, the equal of regular employment is just plain poor business judgment—poor judgment on the part of organized labor for in the long run the laboring man is going to pay as much of the bill as any one else.

successful competitor. Suppose the government makes a loan to this unsuccessful competitor. Suppose, then, he fails to repay the loan and the government forecloses.

You will then have the GOVERNMENT FOR A COMPETITOR.

If your new competitor (the government) undercuts you, and thus runs up a loss, the taxpayer will foot the bill. YOU ARE A TAXPAYER. You will therefore be placed in the position of having to dig into your own pocket to pay the losses of the competitor who UNDERCUTS you.

That won't be nice.

If congress thinks this proposed spending scheme will be popular, it will enact it into law—for congressmen deal in votes and aim to give the voter what they think he wants.

So, if you don't relax the idea of getting the government into com-

petition with you, through the process of lending and foreclosing, you will do well to write to your congressman and urge him to VOTE AGAINST this lending scheme.

ROSEBURG JUNIORS DEFEAT MEDFORD

Visitors Stage Five-Tally Rally in Ninth Inning But Lose Out 11-7.

A determined last inning rally by the Medford Legion Junior baseball team failed to turn back the Roseburg Legion Junior team at Finlay field Sunday. Trailing 11-2 at the start of the ninth inning, the visitors staged a desperate rally in an effort to pull a lost game out of the fire, and garnered five hits off the offerings of Applegate, Hodges and Byrd. However, the nine-run advantage was too much for them to overcome.

Roseburg started the scoring in the last half of the third inning when they combined a walk, wild pitch, passed ball and an error to score one run. They got going again in the next inning when they scored with four more runs. Lawrence started the action when he got on base by means of a fielder's choice. Deffenhard and Hodges each walked and Norton sacrificed. Puckett continued the action when he got on base due to the error of the shortstop. Applegate walked, but was forced out by Byrd. When the smoke cleared, four runs had crossed the plate, and Roseburg was really on its way.

Medford Fights Gamely. The local team soon found out, however, that the Medford men wasn't going to give up. Hodges let a hard hit ball go through his legs, and in the ensuing scramble

Hust went clear around. Medford also failed in the fifth inning when they worked Wray around the bases. Wray singled stole second and scored on Lewis' single.

Roseburg went to work in the seventh and again in the eighth to garner six more runs, three in each. In the seventh, Sanders drove a hard triple deep into left field to score two runs, and he himself was driven in when Lawrence grounded out. In the eighth, singles by Hodges, Puckett, and Applegate, combined with wild pitching that spotted Newland's deliveries throughout the entire game, scored the final Roseburg tally. Newland tossed eight wild pitches, most of them with men on bases.

In the ninth, Medford staged their belated rally and worked around the batting order before being retired. Five singles and a walk scored their runs.

In the event Roseburg wins the first game the title will be decided by two contests, but should Medford win, next Sunday's meeting will become a double-header.

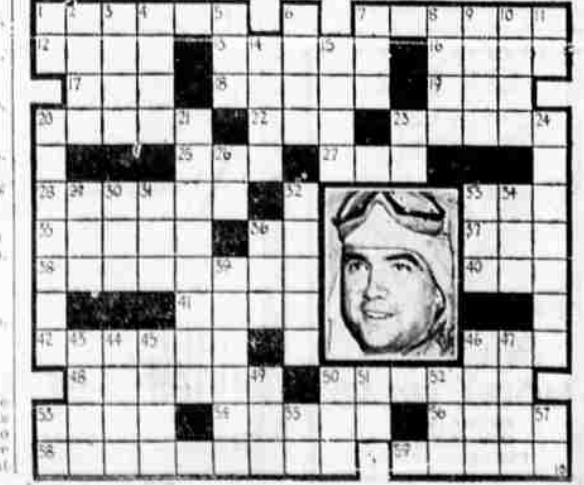

ALL-STAR NINES OF BASEBALL CHOSEN

Pick of American, National Leagues to Battle in N. Y. Tomorrow.

NEW YORK, July 10.—(AP)—Five members of the pace-setting Cincinnati Reds will be in the starting lineup when the National league all-stars square off against the pick of the American league at the Yankee stadium tomorrow.

Manager Gabby Hartnett, in announcing today the lineup he will throw against Joe McCarthy's sluggers, said he would open with Paul Derringer of the Reds on the mound and then probably call on his own Bill Lee of the Cubs and Whitlow Wyatt, Dodgers' ace, for the other three-inning stretches.

The four other starting positions will be held down by members of the Cubs, Cardinals, Giants and Pirates.

The batting order as announced by Hartnett: Stanley Hack, Chicago, third base; Lonnie Frey, Cincinnati, second base; Ival Goodman, Cincinnati, right field; Frank McCormick, Cincinnati, first base; Brule Lombardi, Cincinnati, catcher; Joe Medwick, St. Louis, left field; Mel Ott, New York, center field; Arkie Vaughan, Pittsburgh, shortstop; Paul Derringer, Cincinnati, pitcher.

Ruffing to Start. Proving he has a heart full of sentiment under his amply stuffed uniform, Manager Joe McCarthy announced today his own Red Ruffing would be the starting hurler and five other Yankees would be in the American league lineup for tomorrow's all-star joust with the National league.

Only Boston and Detroit of all the clubs in the junior circuit will be represented when play starts in the seventh annual mid-summer classic in Yankee stadium at 10 a. m. PST.

The batting order given out by McCarthy was: Don Cramer, Boston, right field; Red Rolfe, New York, third base; Joe DiMaggio, New York, center field; Bill Dickey, New York, catcher; Hank Greenberg, Detroit, first base; Joe Cronin, Boston, shortstop; George Selkirk, New York, left field; Joe Gordon, New York, second base; Red Ruffing, New York, pitcher; Tommy Bridges, Detroit, pitcher; Bob Feller, Cleveland, pitcher. This will set a record for representation by one team, and make the event truly a test between the Yankees and the standouts of the National league.

Yet the single real surprise on the roster was McCarthy's selection of Ruffing for the No. 1 pitching assignment. A month ago he appeared the certain choice, but his big right hand has been laboring with a sore arm and has lost his last two starts.

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YANKS DROP FIVE IN ROW TO BOSTON

Homers by Cronin and Foxx Win Sunday's Twin Bill; Chisox Beat Tigers.

It looks like somebody ought to ask the American league to break the Boston Red Sox. Their feat of whipping the New York Yankees five straight in Yankee stadium came close to distracting everybody's attention from tomorrow's major league all-star game in New York and the reverberations are likely to last a lot longer.

Since June 28 the Red Sox have won 12 out of 14 games, the last eight in a row. They have taken two consecutive series from the world champions and climaxed the drive by stifling New York in successive doubleheaders. And they have cut the Yankees' lead from 13½ to 6½ games.

Manager Cronin and Jimmy Foxx were ringleaders in yesterday's 4-3 and 5-3 victories. In the first game the Red Sox were trailing by a run until the eighth inning when Cronin smashed a homer into the left field stands with one on. In the second, they had a two-run margin but Foxx, evidently sensing trouble, hit his 14th home run of the season in the eighth to withstand a final two-run thrust by the champions.

Chisox Down Tigers. Sunday's other American doubleheader all were one-sided. The Chicago White Sox strengthened their third place position by beating the Detroit Tigers, 4-3 and 6-3. Errors by Averill and Rogell wrecked a four-hit game for Newsum in the opener.

The Cleveland Indians went on a hitting spree to beat the St. Louis Browns, 14-2 and 5-1. Heath hit two homers and Trosky one in the first game and Trosky another in the second game. Chase contributed an effective pitching chore to take the nightcap, 10-7.

Cincy, Giants Win. The Cincinnati Reds crushed the Chicago Cubs, 15-3, in the National league as Walters scored his 15th victory on five hits. The New York Giants concluded their invasion of Brooklyn with a 3-2 triumph when Ripple, pinch-hitting for Gumbert drove in the deciding run in the eighth inning.

The Philadelphia Phillies ended an 11-game losing streak by defeating the Boston Bees in both ends of a doubleheader, 3-1 and 7-6. The St. Louis Cardinals and Pittsburgh Pirates divided their bargain bill, but Mize was the star of both shows. The Redbirds took the first game, 7-3, on Cooper's sixth hit pitching and lost the second, 8-6, in a slugfest. Mize hit a homer in each game.

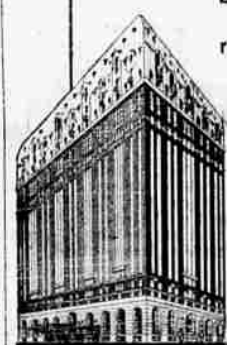
