BENES SAYS PRESS GUARDS DEMOCRACY

CHICAGO, July 11.—(AP)—Dr. Eduard Benes, former president of Czechoslovakia, said today he was leaving for Europe's "dark troubled skies" certain democracy was secure in one country—the United States.

This, he said, was due largely to America's press, which he described as "the best in the world—the most free, most informed and very objective."

Dr. Benes, accompanied by Mrs. Benes and his nephew, Ropius Benes, sails tomorrow for London after a five-month visit in the United States. During which he lectured at the University of Chicago and fulfilled numerous speaking engagements throughout the nation.

"I am tremendously impressed with this country's interest in democracy and in the widespread knowledge, alertness and understanding of the American people on world affairs," Dr. Benes said in a farewell interview.

"This I attribute largely to the American press. The American foreign correspondents are doing an excellent job in objective, accurate reporting, and especially in this time of these correspondents with the major news services."

Thus, in contrast to Europeans, American people not only were well informed, but also gave a perspective on world affairs denied citizens of overseas countries, he said.

NORRIS HOPES F. R. GETS THIRD TERM

WASHINGTON, July 11.—(AP)—Senator Norris (Ind., Neb.) said on his 75th birthday anniversary that although he hopes President Roosevelt will be reelected in 1940, there are others he would choose if he could have his way.

"There are people I know who agree more fully with me than does Mr. Roosevelt on liberalism in government," Norris told reporters. "Mr. Roosevelt is much more of a party man than I am. We don't always agree on everything."

"No one who is known by the people or who has the confidence of the people stands nearly as good a show of election as he would," Norris asserted. "President Roosevelt has done under all the circumstances a most remarkable job. I wouldn't want to put a straw in his way."

"I have always been one of those who did not favor a third term, but the question ought to be considered in the light of conditions that exist at the time."

"My own idea is that Mr. Roosevelt doesn't want to run."

OPEN SEASON ON DOE DEER SLATED

PORTLAND, July 10.—(AP)—The Oregon state game commission Saturday decided to declare a special open season on does in an area set to be defined bordering the male deer preserve in Klamath and Lake counties. The season will run concurrently with the open season for bucks. Special permits will be required for shooting the animals. Five hundred permits will be issued.

Two commission employees were promoted. Harold Sevey was appointed superintendent of game farms in eastern Oregon and Ben G. Snyder, superintendent of farms in western Oregon. They will fill the vacancy caused by the death July 4 of Gene Simpson, state superintendent of game farms. It was decided that in the interest of efficiency two men should take over Simpson's work.

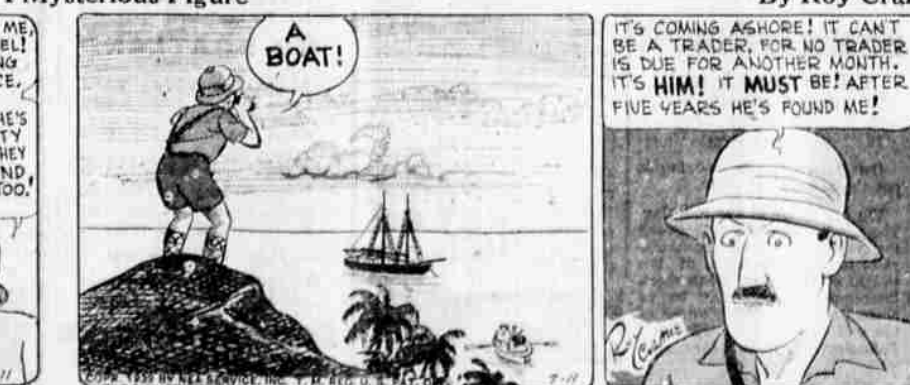
