

SACRAMENTO WIN STREAK ENDS AT 10

Seals Take 3-to-1 Victory From Senators; Beavers, Oaks Divide Two.

Their first loss in 11 games hasn't taken any fire out of the Sacramento Senators, who still are knocking loudly on the first division door in the Pacific coast baseball league.

Sacramento's 7 to 1 loss to the San Francisco Seals at San Francisco last night dropped the Senators a half game from their tie with Oakland for fourth place, as the Oaks staved a double hit with Portland.

Gibson, veteran San Francisco right-hander, kept Sacramento's seven hits well scattered while his mate, seven hits off Sherr, threw three of them in the seventh when

two runs crossed the plate.

The Senators' loss ended a winning streak that had reached 10 games, with a 13-inning tie-throw in.

Beavers, Oaks Split.

At Portland, Oakland won the first half of a twin bill with the just-played Beavers, 3 to 1, but dropped the seven-inning nightcap, 5 to 3, as the home club rallied with two runs in each the fifth and sixth frames. Seattle's second-place Rainiers puffed out a 4-to-3 win over seventh-place Hollywood in the tenth inning at Seattle when Coscarart cracked out a line drive with the bases loaded and two out, scoring Vanni.

NEW YORK, July 13.—(AP)—Billy Conn of Pittsburgh and Melio Bettina of Beacon, N. Y., two tough youngsters who fully expect to be pumkin in the middle of the heavy-weight situation a year from now, clash in a 15-rounder at Madison Square Garden tonight for this country's 175-pound title.

Bettina already has been recognized as light-heavyweight champion by the New York State Athletic commission, and the winner of tonight's tussle will get an official nod from the National Boxing association, making it unanimous.

Conn, reigning favorite of New York fans since his left hook blasted out two victories over Fred Apostol and another over Solly Kriger, has been made a firm choice in the betting, with Bettina's admirers receiving 3-to-1 for their money.

Unless all signs fail, fans should see a holier-than-holy battle. In fact, it should be a peach, providing one's taste runs to toe-to-toe fist fighting. Conn is the factor and his left hook is the prettiest thing in the ring today. Bettina, squat and sturdy, packs the better punch.

The Pittsburgh smoke-eater didn't have a chance to turn his hook and ladder curve and control out on the altar field at Yankee stadium Tuesday, like he did in Cincinnati last year, but he made up for it last night as the Pirates knocked off the Brooklyn Dodgers with a 3-0 coat of whitewashing in the only game on the major league program.

Fireman Brown's latest job of answering the alarm was to put the ball, convincingly and completely, on Whitey Wyatt, who has been just about the hottest newcomer to come down the National league pike since Johnny Vander Meer was dishing out goose eggs last year.

Wyatt had won eight straight up to last night and hadn't been beaten in the National league campaign. So it was time to turn in the alarm to cool him off. And the Fireman, who, you may recall, was famous for that sort of thing in 51 games, or about one third of the entire schedule, last year, came a-rambling. He started the game last night, gave up six hits, ran into trouble only twice, and when he did he ran right out of it again.

The victory boosted the Bucs into a fifth place tie with the daffiness boys in the National league standings.

Both sides of the big leaguer got down to the serious work today of getting the second half of the schedule under way. The boys were all

rested from the three-day all-star holiday and ready to take a crack at the world series cash.

NEUTRALITY BILL SNAG PLEASES NAZIS

BERLIN, July 13.—(AP)—The official German reaction to the United States senate's postponement of any revision in neutrality legislation was that "it does not concern us" but there were indications the step was received with satisfaction.

Newspapers generally printed the news without comment but at least two of them by their headlines indicated the trend of German reaction.

The Fremdenblatt of Hamburg headlined the story, "hard defeat for President Roosevelt"—war participation bill postponed" and the Zwölf Uhr Blatt of Berlin, "a hard blow against Roosevelt—his neutrality revision postponed until 1940."

Officials said the neutrality legislation was "America's business," adding, "it concerns Germany only in the effort to have his bill passed in the effort to have his bill passed the president uses it as war agitation against the German people."

3 ADMINISTRATIVE AIDES APPOINTED

WASHINGTON, July 12.—(AP)—President Roosevelt named today Luchin Currie of Maryland, William H. McElroy of Michigan, and James H. Rowe, Jr., of Montana as three of the six administrative assistants authorized under the government reorganization act. Currie now is an economist with the federal reserve board. McElroy is administrative assistant to Secretary Morgenthau in charge of treasury personnel.
