

WAR GAMES WILL MEET NAZI THREAT

Britain Sets Maneuvers at Time German Congress Will Be in Session.

LONDON, July 13.—(AP)—Prime Minister Chamberlain announced today 12,000 of the nation's 70,000 naval reservists would be called to the colors for fleet maneuvers—part of a program to make Britain ready for any eventuality during the anxious period of August and September. About 150 ships will take part.

He told the house of commons 12,000 retired officers and other reservists would report for duty July 31 and remain active until the end of September, taking part in combined naval and air force war games.

Informed quarters regarded it as significant that the maneuvers would be in progress at the time of the Nazi party congress which opens September 2 at Nuremberg. Many European observers have picked that as a danger period.

In Berlin, the statement was made in informed quarters that Britain's action represented "nothing impressive for Germany." One German source said "we, too, are exercising our reserves."

The force move came as the air ministry was engaged in a series of mass bomber flights over southern France designed to give royal air force pilots practice in long-range flying and at the same time to demonstrate Britain's air power.

By the time of the Nuremberg congress, Britain's land army will have approached the three-quarter-million mark as a result of the growing territorial force and the new conscript army, which will be launched this week and when the first conscripts report for duty.

Back of the curtains on the stage were assembled representatives of the communist party in Mexico, Spain, France, the Soviet Union and so on," Leech said.

"They did not mingle with and were not visible to the general delegation out in the auditorium. Bridges could have been back of that curtain."

Leech said one of those behind the curtains was an instructor from the Lenin institute of Moscow, known in U. S. communist circles as "Bob," who had taught in a workers school attended by Leech at Los Angeles.

State headquarters of the communist party here issued a statement today saying Leech had been expelled from the communist party at Los Angeles in 1936 on "suspicion of being a police spy . . . and under suspicion of being a provocateur for attempting to provoke a general maritime strike in San Pedro."

Doyle's Name Brought In (The name of Stanley M. (Larry) Doyle was brought up in examination of Leech by Thomas Shoemaker, chief government counsel.

Leech said Doyle, identified as a "special agent," had assured him "the immigration service would protect me and my family if I gave an affidavit against Bridges."

The witness said Doyle gave him \$100 in cash for the Leech family expenses on a trip to Portland, Ore., to sign an affidavit against Bridges on Aug. 30, 1937, and offered to buy him a second-hand car if necessary.

He said Doyle did not claim to be connected with the federal government but "seemed very desirous of having me sign an affidavit."

The defense had charged Doyle was the "mastermind of a conspiracy of employers to deport Bridges."

Arthur J. Phelan, district director of immigration and naturalization, said a subpoena would be issued for Doyle to appear here.

Examiner James M. Landis announced today he would discharge Major Lawrence Miller from a subpoena and "refer the testimony to the solicitor of the United States department of labor."

"Whether the matter constitutes a violation of the law of the United States is up to other officials," Landis said.

The defense had asked Major Miller be held for contempt after he admitted Tuesday he swore falsely under oath in the Park De-Jong criminal syndicalism trial at Portland.

PATRONS OFFERED 2 AIR MAIL ROUTES

Under new summer air transport services linking all major Pacific coast cities, air mail patrons of two fast schedules to California, according to a bulletin released today by Postmaster Lester L. Williams.

The postmaster urged Roseburg citizens to acquaint themselves with the two trips and with closing times at the Roseburg post office in order to use the services most advantageously.

Air mail reaching the local post office not later than 2:20 p. m. will be flown from Medford to Calli Angeles at 1:00 p. m. and San Diego at 5:10 p. m. the next day.

If special delivery is added to the air mail it will insure immediate delivery, giving service almost as rapid as a telegram at a cost of only 36c, with practically no limit to the amount shipped.

The recently established air mail routes to Europe are now operating on a regular schedule, leaving New York for France on Wednesdays and for England on Saturdays, the trip requiring but two days to cross. The rate for air mail is 39c per half ounce to all points in Europe.
