MARKET REPORTS

WOOL
BOSTON, July 14.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"The movement of wool has continued to expand this week, and the demand at Boston has quickly been reflected to the west, where the movement has been heavy, at length reaching Texas, where at least five million pounds have been sold in the past week. Prices are back to the May time peak, with class III fine wools being quoted at 65.00 cents, clean basis.

"The market strength has been confirmed by the strong opening at London, where England is taking all crossbreds offered at 20 per cent advance over May and Merinos are up quite 5 per cent on general competition. Left-over wools at Montevideo, also, are moving at higher rates.

"Typical of the piecegoods markets is the advance by the leading producer in the price of tropical worsteds and gathards from 12 1/2 to 17 1/2 cents a yard over last year.

"Mohair is firm with 42 1/2 cents for adult and 52 1/2 to 55 cents for kid prevalent in Texas, according to proportion of kid hair in the lot. The movement is fair."

RECREATION NEWS

Douglas County Conditions Summarized in Forestry Service Bulletin

This bulletin is issued weekly by the Umpqua national forest to furnish authentic information to recreationists. The forest supervisor at Roseburg or any ranger will be glad to give further information about places to go, rights to use, and things to do.

South Umpqua District
Fishing: Reports from fish lake state that the fishing there is still excellent, with everyone who cares to fish, able to take the limit. Most of the fish caught this season have not been large, although an occasional 16 or 18 inch eastern brook trout is landed. Best bait probably has been spinner with worms. Flies, however, have done fairly well. Very few parties have been going in to Buleys lake, but the fishing there is reported to be very good. Stream fishing is reported to be declining, as is usual for this time of year. Some fair catches are still being made.

Roads: All roads in the district are open and in good condition.

Diamond Lake District
Fishing: Fishing at Diamond lake is reported to be fair, with evening fly fishing occasionally very good. Streamers are approaching summer level and are clear. Fly fishing is good.

Roads: All roads are open and in good condition.

Trip: There are four lookout stations which can be reached by automobile in this district. Two of them are now manned—Kelsay mountain and Cinnamon mtte, and the fire guards on duty will be glad to show visitors their fire-finders and explain methods of fire detection and suppression.

North Umpqua District
Fishing: Steelhead trout in numbers were reported to be passing through the racks at Rock creek yesterday. The summer run appears to be on in earnest, and several of these fish are being taken daily. The largest reported to date was 31 1/2 inches long and weighed 12 pounds, 12 ounces. It was taken at Rock creek riffle by O. F. Bell of Pacific Palisades, Calif., and was said by Mr. Bell to be his first steelhead. The fish struck a No. 4 royal coachman. Trout fishing is good both in the North Umpqua and Little rivers. More large trout are being taken in the upper river above Steamboat. The average limit catch here will include two or three 14 to 16 inch fish.

Roads: The North Umpqua road is in good condition, open to the new bridge between the Little river road is somewhat rough, as is also the lower part of Red Butte road. These roads will soon be maintained.

Camps: The Island and Apple creek improved forest camps along the river above Steamboat are proving to be very popular. There are rustic tables and benches, stone stoves and fireplaces, and free fuel is furnished. No camp fire permit is required in these camps.

Bohemia District
Fishing: Fishing is reported to be poor—streams very low, with very few fishermen now on the streams.

Roads: All roads are open and in good condition. It is recommended that those driving to Fairview mountain use the Brice creek road. Forty-two visitors reached the Fairview lookout station last Sunday. There still will be some snow on the mountain this week-end. The Shasta (or Bohemia) hills are just beginning to bloom and during the next few days there will be a fine display of these beautiful flowers.

Forest rangers and guards have a hearty welcome for visitors, and only ask that those who enjoy the forests help to protect them from fire. The law demands that there be NO SMOKING WHILE TRAVELING on one-way roads. Camp fire permits must be obtained, and those camping outside improved posted forest camps must carry axe, shovel and water bucket. Please cooperate and we will all get along fine—Umpqua National Forest.
