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SWELTERING in the summer
heat of Washington, Congress
is perching over what to do about
the neutrality law and is being
hammered by labor to change the
WPA hours. The WPA strike, actu-
ally, is window dressing for the
argument that it is wrong to re-
quire 120 hours of work for WPA
pay.

When the members of congress
get rid of those two aggravating
matters, they may pack up their
things and go home.

Meanwhile the rest of the people
are not so very much concern-
ed with either neutrality legisla-
tion or the WPA strike. The
thought in the mind of most folks
these days is how to get a little
rest and recreation in the out-
doors.

Out here in Oregon we have a
nightly day answer to the recrea-
tion problem. When we want a
little break from the heat and no-
tosity of city life we merely pack
a sandwich or two and a jug of col-
dies (milk for the tots, of course)
and head for the bank of some
cool stream. There, for a few
hours, we are removed from every
mistake that man has made and
contemplate only the splendid per-
fection of the works of nature.

We live in a great country.

But there are grave problems in
connection with our living togeth-
er in one great and unified state.
There are problems both within
and without our borders. These
we place in the hands of our elect-
ed representatives. They do the
best they can toward working out
solutions. But what can be the
right—the absolute right about this
neutrality law problem? Actually
there seems no course that, if
adopted, would not arouse serious
objections. Therefore whatever
congress does, there is going to be
a lot of kicking—at home and
abroad.

What is the right and wrong of
the WPA hour and wage problem?
Congress will either rescind its re-
cent action or will let it stand. In
either event, a great many people
are going to be displeased.

We have hired a congress, at \$10,
000 each per year (and expenses)
to solve our collective problems.
Its members are talking and stom-
ing, and when they announce a de-
termination the plaintiffs will be
dimmed by brass cheers. Mean-
while, lacking placed three matters
in the hands of the members of
congress, let's get a snack togeth-
er and head for the banks of the
Empire. Our worry about what
goes on in Washington today is
not going to be of much help.

NEGLECTED TOWARD U. S. FLAG DRAWS CRITICISM

Editor News-Review: Quite recently two news items of special patriotic interest attracted my attention, both from eastern cities. A Russian-born citizen called before a magistrate for traffic violations made this remark after paying his fine: "One satisfaction for a citizen and a war veteran is to be tried in a court where there is an American flag. I notice you don't have one here. I would like to donate \$5 toward the purchase of a flag."

"The trouble is the American people are not flag conscious. That's the reason we have so many communists."

This man is a World War veteran. Other contributions were added and a flag purchased and dedicated.

The other case I noticed was that of a federal court jurist who was surprised when six newly naturalized citizens offered to buy a flag for his court room. His reply to their offer was: "I hardly feel it is proper for a rich nation to allow you to spend your money for something it should buy."

The jurist directed the building custodian to get a new flag at Uncle Sam's expense.

The supreme court buildings recently constructed had no provision for a flag on the buildings, but some of those we rent as our representative to congress saw to it that poles were put before the building from which our flag floats.

The stars and stripes are the emblem of all we hold dear in this land of liberty.

It makes me hang my head in shame that it should be necessary for foreign-born citizens to need to improve our flag for such an occasion as in the two cases I mentioned.

Lately there have been cases where a child has refused to salute the flag, claiming it was against their religion.

There is nothing in the Christian's Bible to teach such a thing, but just the contrary. The Lord when on earth taught respect to all human government. There is no more idolatry about saluting the flag than saluting a valued friend when we meet one.

There is something decidedly subversive about any person or organization not willing to salute the flag that stands for the blessings we enjoy as American citizens.

Let's become flag conscious and shut those who for any reason refuse to be patriotic and truly American. Now is the time to be true to our foundations of freedom and liberty lest we lose all.

SALEM, W. Va.—(AP)—Eighteen-year-old Kathleen Wade completed her second year of high school the other day after participating in virtually all of the classroom discussions without being inside the school building.

Kathleen, an invalid since 1923, lives four blocks from Salem high school. And through an inter-communication system, with one loud-speaker in her home, another in the classrooms, she attended her classes.

She made the school honor roll and contributed materially, her teachers said, to the class room discussions.

Four years ago the girl was the victim of infantile paralysis. Now, with braces and crutches, she can make her way about a little.

Physicians believed that she should not do too much walking so the inter-communication system was rigged up. By the switch of a lever, she can answer questions which the teacher asks.

GIANTS' CHANCES OF PENNANT DIMMED

Patched-Up Team Unable to Win as Cincinnati Stretches Lead.

If the experts begin reading the New York Giants out of the National league pennant race today, grant them ample justification.

At a time when the team should be at full strength to cut in on the Cincinnati Reds' seven-game lead and protect its own half-game bulge over the Chicago Cubs, infielder Chiozza is out for the rest of the season with a broken leg; Shortstop Birges is "doing time" for rowing with an umpire; First-string Catcher Danning, the team's third best hitter, is hospitalized with a leg infection; and Manager Terry is running out of possible infield combinations.

With Chiozza, both bones in his left leg fractured, definitely lost, Terry is down to bed-rock. Already he has Ott, a natural outfielder, playing third base; Whitehead, a fragile second baseman, shifted over to shortstop; and Kampanis, less than sensational doing full-time duty on the vital second base patrol. If anything more goes wrong, Terry may be forced against his will to adopt the old Brooklyn Dodger slogan of "wait until next year."

Reds Stretch Lead
Meanwhile the Reds are drawing away and the Cubs are creeping up on the Terrymen. The combination of the Giants' 4-3 defeat by St. Louis yesterday with the Cubs' 11-2 shellacking of the Dodgers and the Reds' 4-0 shutout of the Boston Bees left Cincinnati seven games in front of the Giants, the Cubs only half a game behind, and the Dodgers and Cardinals only a game out of second place.

It was a "black and blue" Monday all around. In addition to the Chiozza collision with teammate Joe Moore, from which the latter luckily escaped injury, Rippe of the Giants took a header and Medwick of the Cards was winged by a pitched ball in the game; Lombardi was put out with a split finger nail halfway through the near 4th shutout Battery-mate Walters pinned on the Bees; Manager Cronin of the Red Sox was knocked unconscious as his boys came to the end of a 12-game winning streak in a 13-6 shellacking by the Detroit Tigers, and even the Yankees' DiMaggio was hit with a pitched ball by Feller of the Indians.

That wasn't the only ball Feller didn't control, though. He hit just enough bats for the Yanks to beat him 3-0, behind Hadley's five-hit flailing.

In the day's other games, Klein ran his hitting streak to 16 straight games as he weighed in with two homers that helped Pittsburgh to a 7-4 defeat of the Phillies in the National league, and the Athletics out-slugged the Browns, 13-6, in the American league. The Senators and White Sox were rained out.

KIWANIS GOLFERS WIN FIRST "LEG"

The Kiwanis club won the first annual civic club golf tournament when they defeated the Lions and 29-30 clubs in a tri-cornered match Sunday on the Roseburg Country club course.

The winning dividers scored 39 points to the Lions' 23 and the Twenty-Thirties 18.

By their victory, the Kiwanians won the first "leg" for a trophy jointly sponsored by the three organizations, which becomes the permanent possession of the club winning it three times. The tournament, which drew 27 participants, was arranged by Bill Goodwin of the Lions club, A. J. Wilbur of the Kiwanis and Frank Norton, 29-30 club.

TOWNSEND SPEAKS FOR TAXATION PLAN

Pension Crusader Denies "Ruin" Claim; "Partisanship" Said Nearing End.

PORTLAND, July 18.—(AP)—Dr. Francis E. Townsend told 2500 persons at the Institute of Northwest Affairs last night "we may not get the results from our proposal that we anticipate" but "let's try it once... we've tried everything else and we've tried waiting."

He scoffed at a charge the pension plan bearing his name would produce ruinous taxes.

The pension advocate predicted President Roosevelt would not seek a third term and that the end of "partisanship" was in sight.

Politicians are anathema to the people today. They consider first the welfare of the party. We are learning to think in terms of Americanism, not partisanship," he said.

C. C. Chapman, editor of the Oregon Voter, appeared in opposition to Dr. Townsend and asserted the proposed transaction tax would merely take away purchasing power from one class and transfer it to another, without adding to wealth or production.

He will speak at 8 p. m. on the subject, "The All-American National Recovery Plan."
