If you're thinking of coming to New York to see the Giants, you can take either the Eighth avenue subway to the Polo grounds or a cab to Polytechnic hospital.

Either place you'll find lots of familiar Giant faces, which is the main reason why the Terrys are wallowing around in a five-game losing streak and also why they finished yesterday's 10-3 lashing at the hands of the Pittsburgh Pirates with a second-string first baseman, Johnny McCarthy, pitching for them.

With only Bonura at first and Kampaniot at second in their accustomed positions--all the rest of the pieces are filled with transplanted hired bats--the Giants are in such sorry shape they have asked to have Jurgens, their scrappy shortstop, reinstated. That's so they can hold Jimmy, the bat boy, in reserve in case somebody steps in front of a truck.

So it was no surprise that their crippled club in baseball lost yesterday's game. Still it was a surprise, considering their recent run of luck (all bad) that their newest transfer to the hospital league, Pitcher Walter Brown, wasn't more seriously hurt. His wrist was struck by Vaughtan's line drive and badly bruised, but not broken.

Brownie was back at the Polo grounds today, leaving Danning and Chizzola to play the Polytechnic infield all alone.

In the less crippled sectors of the league, the Cincinnati Reds made the Dodgers go overtime again (this was No. 8) which was merely prolonging the Brooklyn agony until the Reds could get a 4-2 victory. They did it in ten innings when Hershberger singled over a drawn-in infield and sent two mates scampering home.

By a similar score, 4-2, the Cardinals defeated the Phillies in the longest night game (2 hours 25 minutes) played at Shibe park this season.

Shoffner lashed the rampaging Boston Bees to a 3-2 win over the Cubs in the other National league game.

The Chicago White Sox fooled

everybody when they rose up to greatness to whack down the slipping Boston Red Sox, 4-1 and 8-0, in the American league's only double bill.

HEALTH OF DRAIN CHILDREN TESTED

DRAIN, July 20.—A preschool clinic was held in Drain on Wednesday, July 12. Twenty-seven children were examined by Dr. A. N. DOUBLEHEADER OF BASEBALL SLATED

Roseburg, Eugene Juniors and Intermediates to Play Here Sunday.

A doubleheader baseball game will be played at Finlay field, starting at 1:30 p. m. Sunday, between the Junior and Intermediate teams of Roseburg and Eugene. Both the Roseburg and Eugene Junior teams, which usually meet for state semifinal honors, have been eliminated from further competition for the title, Roseburg losing to Medford and Eugene to Toledo.

Frank Passett, coach of the Eugene team, writing to Irving Rie-

gel, chairman of the Roseburg League baseball committee, expresses great disappointment over the outcome of the meetings with Toledo. Passett reports he has one of the best teams turned out in Eugene in recent years, but acclaims the Toledo aggregation as one of the finest he has seen and predicts it may be the outfit which will break Portland's long hold on the state championship.

Eugene for several years has followed Roseburg's practice of providing baseball training for boys between the ages of 9 and 17 years. Those groups are divided into Midgets, Intermediates and Juniors.

For a number of years Roseburg and Eugene have met annually in the inter-district semi-finals, with Roseburg having a decided edge on the records. The games between the two groups always have been hard-fought and interesting, and it is expected Sunday's doubleheader will measure up to the usual stan-

dard of games between the two groups.

The Intermediates will play the first game, probably seven innings, starting at 1:30 to be followed by the contest between the Juniors.
