That fits our shoes.

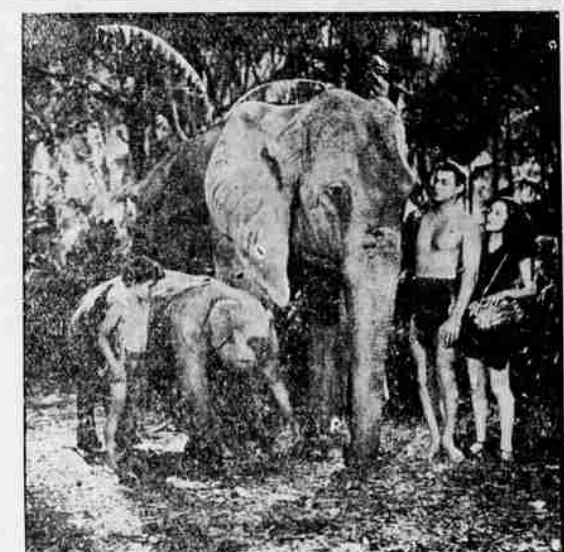
