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Entry Into Retail Grocery Business in Roseburg Step In 29 Years of Operation

Service to Douglas County Food Shoppers Given Also at Stores in Oakland, Glendale and Canyonville; Marts in Roseburg Represent Last Word in Facilities and Conveniences for Customers.

This week the owners of Henninger's Marts in Roseburg celebrate the second anniversary of their entrance into the retail grocery business in this city.

Though only two years in Roseburg, the Henningers have a long record of service to Douglas county citizens. For more than 29 years the proprietors of the business have been residents of the county and identified with retail stores.

In July, 1937, Henninger's Mart now known as Mart number one, located opposite the triangle just north of the Deer Creek bridge, was opened. The new store opened with every new and modern convenience for food shoppers, embodying the last word in display cases and racks with aisle arrangement such that every item is quickly available to buyers.

Departments in addition to regular grocery stocks in Henninger's Mart number one included from its opening a large meat department, drug sundries, and a complete modern beauty parlor. The meat department, equipped with the latest

test type illuminated refrigerator meat display cases, is one of the show places of the great store.

Business Begun in 1909

E. L. Henninger, father of L. E. and A. G. Henninger, owners of the Mart, now a resident of Medford, Oregon, came to Douglas county in 1909 and purchased the E. G. Young and Company store at Oakland, conducting a general merchandise business at that place until his retirement in 1926.

Associated with their father in the Oakland business during their early life, L. E. and A. G. Henninger continued in the mercantile trade, being identified at various times with businesses in Oakland, Canyonville and Glendale.

L. E. Henninger has conducted a store at Canyonville since 1920 and A. G. Henninger has operated a store at Glendale since 1926. Together they established Henninger's Mart in the Creason building, Roseburg, two years ago and now are celebrating completion of their second year of business in Roseburg. Henninger's Mart in Coquille, is a leading food store in the Coos county seat.

CLINIC CLICKS FROM DOUGLAS HEALTH OFFICE

Dr. A. N. Johnson, Douglas county public health officer, is in San Francisco this week attending a medical conference.

Mrs. Hazel B. Lytle, nurse on the staff of the health unit, is expected to return from her vacation next week.

A pre-school round-up clinic was conducted by Dr. Johnson, assisted by Mrs. Mary Barrett, at Glendale, June 21. Fourteen pre-school children were examined and five immunized against diphtheria, three given the tuberculin test, and three the Schick test. Mrs. J. H. Robinson was in charge of the clinic organization and remained throughout the entire clinic. Members of the P.T.A. also gave their assistance.

A pre-school round-up clinic was also held in Glendale, June 30. Nineteen children were examined and seven immunized against diphtheria and 11 against smallpox. Mrs. Mouchette and Mrs. Morey gave assistance during the day.

A pre-school round-up clinic was conducted in Drain July 12. Twenty-seven children were examined by Dr. Johnson. The purpose of the conference was to examine those children who are entering school for the first time this fall and give the parents an opportunity of having all remedial defects corrected before the child enters school. Many were referred to their family physicians for medical care.

In addition to an examination, 9 were vaccinated against smallpox, 19 immunized against diphtheria, and 13 received the tuberculin test. Seven were Schick tested to determine immunity to diphtheria. This group had previously had toxoid to protect from diphtheria.

The clinic was a success due to many hours of labor on the part of Miss Elsie Wisegarver, Mrs. Bill Cool had charge of registrations and Miss Wisegarver, Mrs. Lillian

Spencer, and Mrs. O. A. Snook helped the day of the clinic.

A pre-school round-up clinic was held in Reedsport Wednesday, July 19, and twenty children who will enter school for the first time were examined by Dr. Johnson. In addition to a physical examination, 7 were vaccinated, 11 given the Schick test, 10 the tuberculin test, and 7 were immunized against diphtheria. Mrs. Walter Keating assisted on organization of this clinic and spent the day at the clinic, as she was interested in these students, being the primary teacher at Reedsport. Those assisting Miss Moffat the day of the clinic were Mrs. Berge Borrevik, Mrs. G. M. Leach, and Mrs. Edwin Moreno.

On August 2 a pre-school round-up clinic will be held in Yoncalla. Any students who are to enter school for the first time may attend this clinic and should get in touch with Mrs. B. E. Roberts. All students entering school for the first time from Hayhurst, Pleasant valley, Scotta valley, and Shoshone districts should attend this clinic.

On Friday, August 4, Dr. Johnson will conduct a clinic for immunization against typhoid fever at the Kellogg grange hall at 2 p. m.
