

CHARGE OF MURDER HITS SEATTLE MAN

SEATTLE, July 28.—(AP)—Stewart O. Jacobson, 28, candidate for city council in 1938, was charged yesterday with first degree murder. Prosecutor B. Gray Warner ordered the justice court charge filed after holding him in technical custody two days in connection with the mysterious disappearance Sunday night of Chester Vaughn, 21, roller rink employee formerly of Portland.

O. K. Bodin, chief criminal deputy sheriff, said Jacobson, a county building elevator operator and former candidate for constable, was a former admirer of Miss Dorothy Price, Vaughn's sweetheart.

Vaughn's automobile, its blood-stained interior soaked with kerosene and set afire, was found in the north side early Monday. Officers found an overturned roadster, also bloodstained and containing a small-caliber rifle entangled in a rope, on Lake Sammamish.

Warner ordered Jacobson charged half an hour before a superior court hearing by which Jacobson's attorney sought Jacobson's release under a writ of habeas corpus. He said Jacobson declined to answer questions, on Garvin's advice.

reduction.

One of the 51 democrats who signed a petition causing the caucus Gavagan said he would tie into a single resolution a pledge of loyalty to the party and provisions for the \$2,490,000,000 lending bill and the \$800,000,000 housing bill.

Party Split Cited

He also declared he would tell the caucus the combination of democrats and republicans to defeat administration measures was enacting the democratic party assunder.

Neither of the bills to which Gavagan wants a pledge of support is yet before the house. The leadership decided to defer action until tomorrow on the housing bill and the lending measure was before the senate, where democratic chiefs claim passage by midnight.

On the lending legislation the administration still faced a tough fight, however, as opponents were trying to rally sufficient strength to send it back to committee, an action which would bury it for this session.

Earlier, in arguing for the mortgage refinancing provision Senator Wheeler disclosed he intended to seek elimination from the lending bill of a provision for railroad equipment loans.

Wool Labeling Holds

Before taking up the lending measure, the senate rejected without a record vote a motion to reconsider the vote by which it passed last week a bill requiring labeling of most wool products. The house rules committee already has agreed to postpone action on this measure until hearings can be held, which almost certainly means until next session.

In the house consideration of the administration's \$800,000,000 housing bill was put off until tomorrow in order, Speaker Bankhead said, that Chairman Steagall (D-Ala.) of the banking committee could continue work on the lending bill.

Water Payments Exed

A bill permitting farmers on federal irrigation developments to vary the amount of their annual installments paid to the government to liquidate the cost of the projects in accordance with the earning of their lands from year to year went to the white house today.

President Roosevelt declared himself today to be absolutely in favor of the objectives of the Hatch bill to prohibit "pernicious" political activities.

He added at a press conference, however, there was a real problem involved in the measure, which is at the White House awaiting presidential action. That problem, the president said, is: What can people legitimately do under very broad language?

He said for instance, it might be interpreted to forbid a person to attend a political rally or volun-

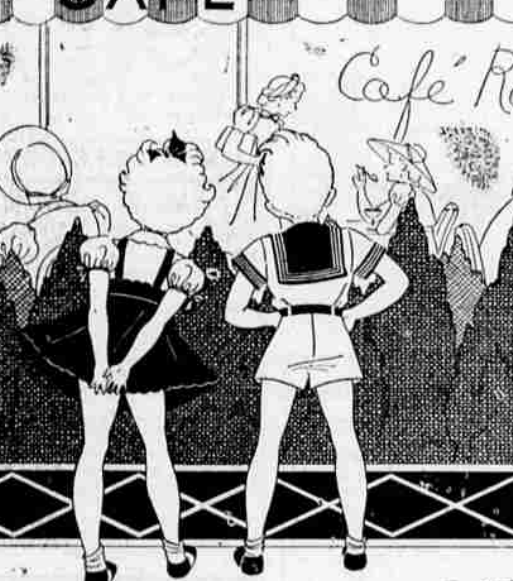

has met with general approval. "I have discussed with him certain phases of organization work which I believe need development in the war against crime and I am hopeful a better degree of cooperation can be worked out among the various law enforcing agencies."

Pray had no comment after conferring with the governor for a half hour this morning.

Appointed in 1931

Pray, originally appointed Aug. 1, 1931, by the late former Gov. Julius Meier when the state police system was organized, is a republican. He was reappointed four years later by former Gov. Charles H. Martin. Martin said he reappointed Pray after Meier had urged him to do so.

Governor Sprague received hundreds of letters and telegrams from persons who wanted Pray reappointed. One of these came from Martin, while many others were from members of the legislature. Pray's salary is \$5,000 a year.

TRAFFIC DEATHS ON INCREASE IN JUNE

CHICAGO, July 28.—(AP)—The nation's success in saving lives on the highways over a period of 20 consecutive months stopped short in June. Like an automobile at a red light.

The steady improvement ended when in June deaths totalled 2,320, an increase of 29 or 1 per cent, over June, 1938. The National Safety Council reported today. It was the first time since November, 1937, that the monthly traffic toll was more than for the corresponding month of the preceding year. However, the council said the first six months of 1939 still showed a 5 per cent reduction from the half-year figure of 1938, 13,500 deaths compared with 14,169.

RAINS EASE SITUATION IN SOME EASTERN STATES

Widespread rains nourished desiccated fields and cooled off sweltering cities over much of the nation today.

Areas in Pennsylvania and New England which have been suffering from drought were soaked, but in most places the relief was only temporary and the benefit limited. Crops needed more moisture than the forecasters could see in prospect.

In most of Pennsylvania sunbaked zone 27 dry days came to an end. Drenching rains fell yesterday, with accompanying storm and flood damage inflicted in parts of the state. Farm experts said more rain was needed to restore the grain and vegetable crops, and that many crops already were lost.

Destruction Continues

Update New York, blistered by one of the severest droughts in its history, viewed clearing skies

joylessly, for in them they visualized the further destruction of crops and pastures. Albany had 3.68 inches of rain in a 25-hour period, but heavier and more general falls were needed. Forest fires in the region were either quenched or brought under control.

South Also Sweaters

Heat and humidity had much of the south in their grip, too. Shreveport, La., reported a high temperature of 99 degrees. Here and there the tropic distress was relieved by showers, which were expected to continue over the week-end.

A mild tornado wrecked six of ten unoccupied tourist cabins at Emporia, Kan. Mrs. B. A. Mickey, wife of the proprietor, who was standing 25 yards away, said she saw some of the cabins blown 40 feet but didn't even feel a breeze, herself. Rains swept along with the wind.
